LETTER FROM FIFTH GRADER

Recently a letter was forwarded to Fern Moe by the Fridley Chamber of Commerce. It was from a fifth grade boy in Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, saying that they were studying American cities and were to research and write about a specific one. He had chosen to research Fridley, MN.!! He was particularly interested in the origin of the name of our city. Mrs. Moe sent him a letter regarding the origin of the name and a little about the history of Fridley.

And maybe this is the time for a little history lesson about the origin of the Fridley name. It is commonly believed that Fridley was named after Russel Fridley, who for many years was the Director of the Minnesota Historical Society. This is not true. The Fridley name goes back much furthur than that. Russel Fridley has not been able to trace his lineage back to the Abram M. Fridley who moved to our area in the mid 1800's. This area at that time was called the territory of Manomin. Abram Fridley and his wife purchased the 16 room colonial mansion that had been built earlier by U.S. Senator Henry M. Rice. It was located in the very south part of Fridley along East River Road. Mr. Fridley was elected as Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and later to the Minnesota Legislature. It was at that time that he suggested to the State Legislature that the name of this area be changed to Fridley. It was changed by an act of the legislature in 1879.

LEASE AGREEMENT

As you know, the Fridley Historical Society is leasing the Museum (formerly the Hayes Annex building) from the Dist. #14 Fridley School District. There has been a verbal agreement between the School District and the Society for a couple of years. In August a formal agreement was drawn up by our attorney, Don Savelkoul. The attorney for the School District was not happy with that agreement, so he drew up another one, which was to have been signed by both parties at the October School Board meeting. There were a couple of paragraphs in that lease agreement that concerned the Board of Directors and our attorney. Warren Woods, Leon Madsen and Fern Moe attended that October 20th meeting and stated our concerns, but on the advice of Don Savelkoul, we did not sign the lease. Mrs. Moe has since met with Roger Schmaus from the School Dist. and the differences have been resolved, so we will be signing the lease before the November 17th meeting of the School That lease will run for 10 years at \$1.00 per year, so that about Nov. 1, 1997, a new lease agreement must be drawn up for the following five years. ####################

MUSEUM BASEMENT ROOM

Interest was expressed this summer by the Onan Corporation to help us by redoing the large room in the basement of the museum, to be used as a media room and a meeting room and to be called the Onan room. Prices from a contractor were submitted to the Onan Corp. A recent letter from an Onan representative to Mrs. Moe, asked the hours that the Museum will be open and an estimate of the amount of useage that the room will have. Ms. Moe is currently surveying various organizations to appraise their needs for such a meeting room. The results of the survey will be sent soon to Mr. Phelps at Onans.

In talking with Sylvia and Tom at the Community Center, it seems that the schedule for the library room is nearly full and requests for use have to often be turned away. The library room compares in size to our basement room at the museum. School officials seem to feel it would be used often by students

and teachers who would come to the museum on field trips and while there would view films, slides, and tapes about the history of this area, in addition to the history of Minnesota.

Word has been received from the Minnesota Historical Society Grants office that our Grant request for money to make the Museum accessible for the handicapped, is being considered and we are invited to attend and make a five minute presentation before the Grants Review Committee on November 17th. Some of the Society Board members will attend If our application this meeting. is accepted for payment, the money will be available by Dec. 15th.

One of the stipulations in receiving this money is that the money must be matched dollar for dollar with donated labor and donated or purchased materials. We are talking about \$7,500 dollars worth!! We'll need help from you carpenters and cement workers, and electricians, or anyone who can spare a few hours of their time. We can use both professional and unskilled help. We also need a 36" exterior door, three interior 36" doors, 5/8" gypson board, 3/4" exterior plywood, 5/8" interior plywood, 2X4's, fiberglass batt insulation, stair treads and risers, and much We also need the use of a more. masonry cutting tool.

FRONT STEPS

Robert Schmidt of the Fridley Jaycees has contacted his brother who is a cement contractor in Bloomington and he has agreed to redo the sides of the front steps on the museum. Wyatt Brothers has agreed to furnish the cement. Mr. Schmidt is hoping to find some wrought iron railing to install at the same time. We certainly appreciate this help. The Schmidt brothers grew up in Fridley.

Raymond (Bud) Anderson Passed Away

We were saddened in December when Ray passed away. He had struggled with cancer the last couple years. He was married to Gladys Gottwaldt and they had two children--Mark, who is married to Kathy Becker from Princeton and Rebeka who is married to John Chismar. Being with the family on Wed, December 16th, brought back lots of memories that date back to April, 1957 for me. I saw an ad in the paper advertising for a cook at Maple Lanes Cafe. In those days Bill and Dick Gottwaldt and Don Savelkoul owned the Maple Lanes Bowling Alley, and what is now the Chanticlear Pizza place was then called the Maple Lanes Cafe, and it was owned by the two Gottwaldt sisters and their husbands--Gladys and Ray Anderson, and Edna and Ludwig Ask. I had cooked for the Odegaard Cafe people at Milaca, and at the Hamburger Home at Jordan, Minnesota, so I applied for the job and got it. Those of us who worked for Gladys and Edna became like part of the family! It was a pleasant place to work. My sister, Joan, also worked for them for awhile. She and her husband have lived in Georgia for many years and have raised two lovely daughters. I worked for Gladys and Edna until 1965, when I took a job with School District #14. During those years at Maple Lanes Cafe, I got to know many special people. Some of them have passed away--like the Bill Plums, and Clarence and Nellie Kranz, and I know there are others whose names don't come to me now. In the late evening the bowlers used to come in for a late night snack. Some of those who frequented the Cafe for delicious pork tenderloin sandwiches (one of our specialities), and other gastronomical creations were Bill and Esther Campbell, Jean and Harvey Waggar, Les and Ardie Chesney, Jerome and Alice Polkey (and Alice worked there for awhile), Dan and Virginia Webber. (Virginia also worked as a waitress there during those years. They now live in Scottsdale, Arizona). And many others, the list could go on and on. Charlie Johanson often ate there, and Pete Brooks, and the Fridley Police frequented the place for gab sessions (coffee breaks)! At that time Everett McCarthy was Chief, Lynus Fritz, Bob Cook, and Hilliard Vought were on the Police force. I shouldn't even attempt to name names when I don't have room here to name everyone. Vi Gottwaldt also worked there with us, and there were others.

It was great to see the younger generation at the funeral. They have grown up and are filling useful places in the world—Carol (Lud and Edna's daughter), and Bill and Vi's "kids", and Dick and Jo's "kids", Becky and John with Ray and Gladys's only grandchild, Timmy, and Mark and it was good to meet Kathy who knows my relatives from Princeton. Becky and John have purchased the other half of the duplex where Gladys lives. That's where Ray's folks used to live. We will miss Ray. He was a member of the Fridley Historical Society from nearly "day one".

LETTER FROM Margit Bremer Toner:

As a Fridley resident and member of the Fridley Historical Scoiety, I cannot refrain from sharing some old time memories of Fridley, although I was raised in Blaine.

We had the Fridley post office address for many years. The post office was located on the River Road next to the Locke House. The venerable postmaster was Mr. J.B. Ryberg, who before coming to Fridley had served in public office in Hennepin County. I remember him as a dignified and portly gentleman with a white goatee. He was the grandfather of Rodney Johnson.

Our faithful mailcarrier had a long route into Blaine by horse and buggy or sleigh, in all weather and road conditions. I remember that we kids accompanied my father when he drove the horses and wagon to Fridley to have the horses shod at the Blacksmith Shop across the road from the Post Office. The esteemed Blacksmith was Mr. Wm. McCready, who now rests in that tiny cemetery on the hill behind the Episcopal Church site. Regretfully that little historic church has been moved from there.

Certainly an important part of the Fridley History is C.A. Nelson dairy business and dairy farms. The Nelson mansion and dairy farm was located on the East River Road where the Lynwood Health Care Center now stands. Mr. Nelson established the Clover Leaf Creamery Co. in North Minneapolis, which has been owned and operated by the family these many years. The Nelson farms in Fridley were the Tipperary and North Pole farms, and in Blaine, the Orchard Hill, Burr Oak and Clover Leaf Farms.

An exciting childhood memory is that of accompanying my mother to the spacious Nelson home, when the gracious Mrs. C.A. Nelson was the hostess to the Redeemer Ladies Aid Society.

It is a family owned business, and Mark and Bryan are the installers. Mark graduated from high school in 1974. After graduating he went to Bible School for two year: then worked for a company as an installer for another three years. In 1979, he started in-They rented a building stalling on his own. from Gus Doty at Fridley Office Plaza for three years, and then moved to their present location two years ago. They have tentative plans to move to a larger place in Moon Plaza by April It would seem that a person could expect that a business owner, who also does the installing of carpet would do a precise and exacting job!! Mrs. Anderson tells me that there is another business in Fridley called Carpet Design Center, located at 7151 University. is not the same company that I am referring to. This company is called New Carpet Design. could be confusing! New Carpet Design also has blinds, wallpaper, counter tops, and upholstery, and fabrics.

Baseball Night

The April 11th meeting of the Fridley Historical Society, a night of reminiscing about baseball in Fridley, was well attended. Warren Woods, our treasurer, is also a baseball buff, and did a tremendous job of pulling the program together. In 1948, 1949, and 1950, Fridley had a town team. Three of the players attended the program that evening: Vern Gottwaldt, Walter Ness, and Don Granlund. Harry Messick, a former high school baseball coach also attended our evening of baseball. Refreshments were served after the meeting and reminiscing continued as one of our members, Fred Schultz told about baseball in Fridley in the 1930's. Fred brought along a baseball glove and other memorabilia from those days.

Minnesota Historical Society Annual Meeting

On Friday, April 15th, Lillian Meyer and Fern Moe attended the day long annual meeting of the Minnesota Historical Society. Moe attended sessions regarding writing effective grant applications, information about various grants available, cooperative projects, etc. Meyer attended sessions having to do with preservation and exhibits. In the afternoon she and others in that group toured St. Paul's Lowertown Historic District. Both felt they had had a very helpful and interesting day.

Chamber of Commerce Luncheon

Marion Anderson and Fern Moe, both of the Historical Society Board, attended the 15th Annual Chamber of Commerce Employee Appreciation Day Luncheon on April 27th at the Skywood Inn. Rose Totino was the guest speaker. She gave an inspiring and heart warming speech, detailing her life history, and reminding all that monetary gain is not the most important gain in life.

Grant Application

Word was received on April 15th that our grant application, submitted on January 20th, 1988, was recommended by the Grants Review Committee to be paid in the maximum amount of \$7,500. This money is to be used for modifications to provide handicapped accessibility to the Museum. This project is supported with funds provided by the State of Minnesota through the Minnesota Historical Society's Grants-in-Aid Program, and along with the \$13,500. donated by the V.F.W., now allows us to start construction. Our architect, Foster Dunwiddie, who had met with us again on March 27th, has put together a bid package, and has submitted this to four contractors. Bids are expected to be back in about two weeks. The rear entrance of the Museum will be widened to accommodate a wheelchair, housing for the lift will be installed, and a bathroom will be roughed in in the basement that will be accessible for the handicapped. Moe will submit another grant application by July 20th, for help with the actual purchase of the lift, which will cost about \$16,500. Other funding possibilities are also being pursued.

Redwood Sign

A redwood sign, donated by the V.F.W. Post #363, will soon be installed in the front yard of the Museum. Jerry Manley, who is a member of the V.F.W., and also one of our Board Members, was the liason between the sign company and the V.F.W. The sign has been received, and when the necessary permits are completed, it will be installed.

Landscaping

Word has been received from the Horticulture Department of the Anoka Technical Institute, that they could not work our landscaping project into their schedule for this year, as they had formerly promised. Work will need to be done immediately to at least cover the bare dirt around the parking lot. We would be glad to hear from anyone who is willing to help with yard work, or who has black dirt, grass seed, or sod for this project. We are also looking for someone with experience in landscaping who can provide us with advice on the location of plantings that will beautify the grounds around the Museum.

Baseball Caps

Light blue and white baseball caps are now available with our windmill and Fridley Historical Society logo. Anyone interested in purchasing these caps may call Board Member, Earl Johnson at 484-7286. Caps sell for \$5.00.

49er Days

Plans are underway for members to take part in the annual 49ers Day Parade on Wednesday, June 15th. The Historical Society will again sell ice cream goodies to parade viewers. Earl Johnson and Warren Woods are on the 49er Day Committee for our organization this year.

Insurance Recommendations

Recommendations by a company, North Star Risk, representing our insurance company, is being complied with. Gloria Hayes purchased "No Smoking" signs, which are posted throughout the Museum. Jerry Manley purchased and installed four fire extinguishers in the Museum, and he also purchased emergency lighting to comply with the recommendations. \$1000. donation from the Lion's Club paid for these purchases. Another of the recommendations is that a center handrail must be installed in the outside steps. Robert Schmidt, the new president of the Jaycees, and his brother, who is in the cement contracting business, have offered to redo the front steps, and will install the center rail at that time. Mr. Schmidt feels that they will get this done within the next two weeks.

Construction

The word at the Museum these days is construction!! The KM Building Company was the low bidder for the job of remodeling the building to make it accessible to the handicapped. The back entrance has been enlarged and changed somewhat. The shaft that will house the lift is done, with a door out into the large basement room that will one day be our media room, and a door on the main floor into the east room. The bathroom for the handicapped is in in the basement, and is partly finished. The project is about 3/4 done, and is scheduled to be completed by August 5th. Bids have just came in on the lift. The low bidder is Medical Aids, Inc. with a price of \$18,631. It will be a 3stop lift. Meaning that people coming into the lift at the level of the back door will be able to go up to the first floor, or down to the lower level. It will have a maximum load limit of 750 lbs. Minnesota code requires that a water fountain and a service sink be installed before the building can be open to the public. These were things that were not included in the original bid. The basement floor in the large media room was in bad shape, and has been torn out. The cement looks good, so likely we will just carpet over it when we can afford it. That room also needs to be insulated and painted before another winter. Also, the building needs to be tuckpointed before another winter. The heating bill was too high this last year.

Landscaping

Needless to say, landscaping has been a nightmare this year. The Moes tried planting part of the lawn, and even put down a little sod, but now with the water shortage getting so severe, it looks pretty hopeless to try to save it. City hall will

have some extra bushes for us, when their construction is completed. Lets hope that we are getting rain by then.

Grant Application

Fern Moe has submitted an application to the Minnesota Historical Society for help in financing the second phase of the construction project, which is primarily the purchase of the lift, its installation, and some door framing that will need to be done after the lift is in. The lift will cost \$18,631. installed. Another \$200. should take care of the framing. The maximum amount that could possibly be available from the Minnesota Historical Society is \$7,500. That means that we have to do alot of fund-raising between now and November 15th!!

Upcoming Meetings

The next regular meeting for the membership is on Monday, September 12th. That evening we will view a film about the 1930's and then reminisce about how the drought of those days compared with this year, and how those early '30's affected the economy in this area. Members and non-members are welcome.

Our annual meeting in October will be held on October 3rd. It will be a Railroad Night!! We have an excellant speaker lined up, who is very knowledgable about the early railroads and the impact that they made on communities. We will also be entertained that evening by Fridley's own Kelly family! They are a real treat to listen to. Such talent!! As always, non-members are welcome to come, also.

Band Concert

The Fridley City Band held a concert on the grounds of the Fridley Historical Society on Monday evening, July 11th. It was a lovely evening. Can you believe that it was almost cold sitting in the shade that evening!! We have really had a heat wave this summer. We are making history everyday! We have a very talented City Band. Construction

On Thursday, September 1st, a final walk thru inspection was conducted at the Museum. Board member, Leon Madsen represented the Society, others there was the contractor, and the architect. There were still a number of things left to do. Just mostly little things, although one of the things was that they had moved the drinking fountain down from the upstairs back hall (at my request--rather than purchase a new one), but it was not working. It turns out that it needs parts, which are no longer available. Fortunately the City Hall has a drinking fountain which will not be used in the new construction, so they are donating it to us! The building inspector is requiring a service sink to be installed in the utility room downstairs, and that has yet to be done. Now, the only thing left to be done is to purchase the lift. The cost of the lift is \$18,631. We are trying to come up with the money for it. We have submitted grant applications to the Minnesota Historical Society, and also to Medtronics. We are presently doing alot of begging!! We also are looking into other fund-raisers.


Programs for this coming year:

- October 3rd, 1988 Railroads. Railroads had alot to do with bringing growth to our community. Gary Browne will be our speaker. He is well-known among railroad people as a train enthusiast, and is knowledgeable about the early train activity in our area. The Kelley family from Fridley will provide the entertainment for the evening.
- November 7th, 1988 From Shoebox to Showcase. A program about photography preservation. Donna Martin will be our speaker. She has many good ideas about preserving photographs at the museum as well as at home.
- January 9, 1989 Fashions of an Era. James Morehouse from the Minnesota
 Historical Society will bring some actual clothes from yesteryear
 for us to see, and will talk about the changing styles and the problems
 involved with dressing stylishly.
- February 6th, 1989 We will view two short movies...one entitled Homespun, which is a story about a Swedish woman from Minnesota who raises her own animals, shears them, and spins the wool and does her own weaving. The other movie is entitled Pioneer Spinning and Weaving. Then we will look at some actual weaving by people from our community.
- March 3, 1989 We do not have an actual meeting scheduled for March, but will have a spagetti dinner again, like we did last year.
- April 3, 1989 Time and Civilization, a historical perspective. Harvey Glommen, who has a Clock Shop in Spring Lake Park, will talk to us about the development of sequencing and time measuring devices, and how they are closely related to our civilization. The mechanical time keeping devices used today are a reflection of yesterdays demands and cultural development.
- May 1st, 1989 We will view a film entitled Life on the Farm. The concern of farm families 200 years ago was simple survival. On a replica of a 1770's farm, a family of four lives as their pre-Revolutionary forebears did. From sumup to sundown they work. They haul water and produce all their food. The women card wool and spin it into thread; they cook over the open fire, the only source of heat. Father and son work in the fields and tend the animals. At night the children climb to the loft above the cabin's single room to sleep on a bed of hay. The basic human needs food, shelter, clothing have not changed in 200 years, but obtaining them has. Glimpses throughout the film of a modern household underlines the enormous gap in lifestyles.

According to the by-laws there are not to be any meetings through the summer months of June, July, and August. If members desire to have this changed, there must be an amendment added, proposed in writing filed with the secretary by any three members. The secretary shall notify all members in writing of the proposed amendment, and it may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the <u>annual</u> meeting, if a quorum is present and provided two weeks shall have elapsed after the sending of the notice. Unfortunately, there is not time this year to make a change, as the annual meeting is October 3rd.

Personally, my feeling is that until we get the building air-conditioned it is not possible to have a meeting in there in July or August. The first part of June likely would not be too warm yet. This summer, which was unusually hot, anyway, we held our August board meeting outside on the lawn!!

We realize that air-conditioning the building has to be one of the top priorities after we get our building ready to be open to the public. It is necessary for the preservation of the artifacts.

water heater for us, too. Also,
in the spring there will be some
extra bushes for around the Museum.

Two New Committees Formed

The F.H.S. President has appointed chair people for two new standing commit-These people will attend Board meetings, and report on their committee each time. Fred Schultz has been appointed chairman of the Local History Committee. This will be an on-going top priority committee to record current as well as past pictures and information about people and businesses in our community. Sometimes its hard to remember that current happenings are history and it is important to have someone keeping track of things and dates that will be valuable information for the future. Armistice Day Storm, November 11th, 1940

I happen to be typing this Newsletter on November 11, 1988, and so I am reminded of the snow storm on that day. How many of you remember it? Likely there were earlier snow storms that compared to it. The storm started out as a fine rainy mist; then it got colder and windy, and the mist froze and turned to snow and ice. Transportation was at a standstill. It was in the days of street cars and everybody got stranded where they were. The snowstorm covered eight midwestern states. In Minnesota alone it paralyzed most transportation and communication. It started snowing the afternoon of the 11th, and didn't quit until the 14th, leaving snow drifts five feet high. Winds were gusting up to 80 miles per hour, and the temperature dropped to near zero. South Minneapolis, and many other areas were left without electricity. Police cars were used as ambulances to take expectant mothers to the hospital. No weather reports were available because the Weather Bureau was unable to function. When the storm subsided it revealed ten thousand dollars worth of damage, consisting of wrecked buildings, uprooted trees, downed wires, and smashed windows. Snowplowing alone cost the City of Minneapolis one hundred thousand dollars. The storm took more than fifty lives. A couple of fellows that we knew had gone hunting, and were found frozen to death about a week later. They left seven young children fatherless. My sister was born on the 15th, but on the afternoon of the 14th when mother went into labor, dad started out with the team of horses and the sleigh to get the doctor. It took many days for the roads to be opened up so that we could get out with the car. I remember that the snow banks were packed with ice and snow that we could even drive the horses over them and they wouldn't sink in. Let me know what you remember about this and other snowstorms, so that I can put it in the next Newsletter.

Remember Butchering Day?

November also reminds me of butchering day, because we had to wait until the weather was cold enough so that we could leave the animal hang and the meat would not spoil, therefore, we butchered a hog and sometimes a beef in November. Dad always went deer hunting, and if he got a deer, he liked to butcher a hog to com-

with the deer meat for sausage.

Early in the morning on butchering day, a fire was built under an oil drum that we had for this purpose. It was tipped half over and half filled with water. This water was heated nearly to boiling. Then came the time to shoot the pig. I would always run to my bedroom and stop my ears with my pillow, because I didn't like to hear that part. The hogs jugular vein was pierced to bleed the animal, and then the hog was dipped into the hot water by using a pulley contraption hanging from a near-by tree. The hide was scraped until most of the hair was off, and then it was hung from the tree while it was cleaned out. Mother was always there with a pan for the heart and liver, and our first meal from the animal was usually the liver. Mother made headcheese, pickled pigs feet, besides smoking the hams and bacon. The lard was ground and rendered in the oven. The sausages were usually fried, and packed in jars, covered with lard and sealed. We did not have freezers. It was a long, hard day of work, but it seemed that my parents had a sense of satisfaction after it was over and the meat was "in store" again.
