HISTORY

ANOKA COUNTY

Information for this county has been gathered from the "History of the Upper Mississippi Valley," 1881, in which Anoka county and its civil divisions are treated in pages 222-293; from the "History of Anoka county and the Towns of Champlin and Dayton in Hennepin County," 320 pages, 1905, by Albert M. Goodrich; and from Charles W. Lenfest, county treasurer, Frank Hart, clerk of the court, and Clarence D. Green, real estate agent, during a visit to Anoka in October, 1916.

Anoka was founded by Orrin W. Rice, Neal D. Shaw, and others, by whom its name was adopted in May, 1853. The "City of Anoka" was incorporated by the state legislature July 29, 1858, and later the "Borough of Anoka," March 5, 1869, but both these acts failed of acceptance by the vote of the township. Finally, under a legislative act of March 2, 1878, this city was set off from the township of the same name, the first city election being held on March 12.

Bethel was first settled in 1856 by Quakers, and was organized the next year. Its name is from ancient Palestine, meaning "House of God," and was selected for this township by Moses Twitchell, who settled here as an immigrant from Bethel, Maine.

Blaine township, settled in 1862, was the east part of Anoka until 1877, when it was separately organized and was named in honor of James Gillespie Blaine, a prominent Republican statesman of Maine. He was born in Pennsylvania, Jan. 31, 1830, and died in Washington, D. C., Jan. 27, 1893; was a member of Congress from Maine, 1863-76, being the speaker in 1869-75; U. S. senator, 1876-81; and secretary of state, March to December, 1881, and 1889-92. In the presidential campaign of 1884 he was an unsuccessful candidate. He wrote "Twenty Years of Congress," published in 1884-86.

Burns township, settled in 1854 or earlier, was a part of St. Francis until 1869, being then organized and named, probably for the celebrated poet. This name was adopted on the suggestion of James Kelsey, who was elected the first township treasurer.

The village of COLUMBIA HEIGHTS, a suburb of Minneapolis, in the south edge of Fridley tonwship, was platted and named by the late Thomas Lowry of that city.

St. Francis township, settled in 1855 and organized in 1857, bears the name given by Hennepin in 1680 to the Rum river. It was transferred by Carver in 1766 to the Elk river, and now is borne by the chief northern tributary of that river. The name is in commemoration of St. Francis of Assisi, in Italy, who was born in 1181 or 1182 and died in 1226, founder of the Franciscan order, to which Hennepin belonged.

Fridley, a fractional township comprising only about sixteen square miles, was established by legislative act as Manomin county (meaning Wild Rice), on the same date, May 23, 1857, with the establishment of Anoka county. "John Banfil settled in what is now Fridley in 1847, and kept a stopping place for the accommodation of travelers. Two years later Henry M. Rice acquired considerable land and built a country residence at Cold Springs, giving his name to the creek which flows through the town. . . . A ferry across the Mississippi river was established about 1854." (Goodrich, pages 162-3). This very small county continued nearly thirteen years, until in 1869-70 it was united with Anoka county as Manomin township. The name was changed to Fridley in 1879.

Grow township, settled about 1853, was organized in 1857 with the name Round Lake, which in 1859 was changed to Grow, in honor of Galusha Aaron Grow, of Pennsylvania. He was born in 1823, and died in 1907; was a member of Congress, 1851-63, and again in 1894-1902; was the speaker of the House, 1861-3. "For ten years, at the beginning of each Congress, he introduced in the House a free homestead bill, until it became a law in 1862." This grand public service has caused him to be remembered gratefully by millions of homesteaders.

HAM LAKE township, settled in 1857, was attached to Grow township till 1871, when it was separately organized. It had been previously called Glengarry, a name from Scotland, which its Swedish settlers found difficult to pronounce. The county commissioners therefore named the new township Ham Lake, from its lake in sections 16 and 17, which had acquired this name on account of its form.

LINWOOD township, first settled in 1855 and organized in 1871, received its name from Linwood lake, the largest and most attractive one in a series or chain of ten or more lakes extending from northeast to southwest through this township and onward to Ham lake. The name doubtless refers to the lin tree or linden. Our American species (Tilia Americana), usually called basswood, is abundant here, and is common or frequent through nearly all this state.

OAR GROVE township, settled in 1855, was organized in 1857. "The name is derived from the profuse growth of oak trees, which are about equally distributed over the township." (Upper Mississippi Valley, page 285).

RAMSEY, first permanently settled in 1850, was organized in 1857, being then named Watertown; but in November, 1858, this township was renamed in honor of Alexander Ramsey, the first governor of Minnesota Territory, 1849-53, and later the second governor of this state, 1850-63.

In Memory of Ludwig Ask

The Fridley Historical Society is saddened by the death of one of our charter members. Ludwig Ask was a faithful supporter of all the Society's activities. He contributed many stories of early life in the community and enjoyed hearing about other members' tales.

Ludwig Ask died December 9, 1997 at the age of 89. He will be sorely missed.

QUILT in the Johanson/Bacon Room








And the Winner is...


February Visitors

Border battles precede birth of Minnesota Territory

n May 29, 1848, Wisconsin became a state and the settlers who lived in the area between the St. Croix and Mississippi rivers became a people without a government.

The region had formerly been St. Croix County, the westernmost county of the Wisconsin Territory. And with the Wisconsin state government forming with somewhat smaller boundaries, the territorial government ceased to exist.

Two years earlier in 1846, Morgan L. Martin, a Wisconsin territorial delegate in the U. S. House of Representatives, introduced a bill to create the separate territory of "Minasota" in the area between the Mississippi and St. Croix rivers. Illinois Congressman Stephen A. Douglas of the House Committee on Territories amended the proposed name to the "Itaska Territory." Members of Congress also suggested the names Jackson, Washington, and Chippewa for the proposed territory.

On March 3, 1847, after the name "Minnesota" was selected, the legislation to create a new territory stalled. The measure was tabled after a senator suggested that the region was just too sparsely populated to be a territory, especially if that meant an appropriation for a territorial government.

Later that year, Congress passed enabling legislation that allowed Wisconsin to begin organizing as a state. The legislation included prescribed borders that followed Wisconsin's current state boundaries.

When the Wisconsin constitutional convention met in December 1847, a small minority of the delegates convinced fellow Wisconsinites that they should extend the western boundary further than was allowed by the enabling federal legislation. They decided the western border ought to run from the mouth of the Rum River northeast to the rapids of the St. Louis River. Had that been allowed to remain, much of what is now the Minneapolis-St. Paul metropolitan area would be in Wisconsin.

Leaders from St. Croix County were opposed to any change to the borders that Congress prescribed. Joseph R. Brown. Franklin Steele, and William R. Marshall, foreseeing a future Minnesota, lobbied Congress to leave the borders where they were in the enabling legislation.

Brown and others argued that the new border set by the Wisconsin convention would be untain to any new territory created in the region. The border proposed by the Wiscon-

sinites had been placed up river from St. Anthony Falls, and no river traffic could proceed past that point. Under such conditions, the territory of Minnesota, if it was created, wouldn't have had a single Mississippi River landing suitable for commercial use.

Brown and his conorts were counting on the fact that Congress would side with them on the border issue, effectively leaving St. Croix County without a government. Congress would be forced to designate the region as the Minnesota Territory.

Congress reinstated the boundaries that had been in the initial enabling act and granted Wisconsin statehood. However, Congress failed to act on the issue of St. Croix County, leaving the area an unorganized region.

In other situations where reorganization created a "no-man's-land," such as was once the case for northeastern Iowa, an adjacent territory was given jurisdiction over the region. States, however, cannot extend authority beyond their state lines. Neither Iowa to the south nor Wisconsin to the east could extend legal jurisdiction into the former St. Croix County.

Residents of the area were confronted with the lack of a civil authority to bind business transactions, civil marriages, and other official proceedings.

Civic leaders met in Stillwater on May 29, 1848, to discuss their plan of action. An interesting legal argument emerged from their discussions. Since portions of the Wisconsin Territory were not included in the organization of the state of Wisconsin, the area left over remained a territory, they believed. The state of Wisconsin and the territory of Wisconsin could exist side by side, each a distinct political entity.

Sibley, who had studied law but made his living in the trading business, argued before the committee that the residents of the new territory of Wisconsin were accorded the rights of the Ordinance of 1787, which created the

Northwest Territory. These rights could not be arbitrarily withdrawn, he claimed.

Sibley won the recommendation that he be seated: however, Congress did not officially recognize a territorial government.

In the early part of 1849, political pressure mounted to create territorial governments in California. Nebraska, and New Mexico, as well as Minnesota. Democrats, Sibley among them, argued for increased expansion into the West, especially considering the development of a transcontinental railroad, which would provide even greater access to these lands. Whigs sought to delay the process so their newly elected president, Zachary Taylor, could appoint the executives of these new territorial governments.

Having recently been elected to the Senate, Stephen Douglas was able to get a Minnesota bill through the Whig-controlled House by linking it to the creation of the Department of the Interior, a measure the Whig Party greatly desired.

On March 3, 1849, the last day of his term. President James Polk signed the law creating the territory of Minnesota: however, President Taylor would make all the territorial appointments. The territory included the present state of Minnesota and the portions of North Dakota and South Dakota east of the Missouri River.



Henry H. Sibley was elected by the convention and later by a general election "to proceed to Washington City to best tend to effect the early organization of the Territory of Minnesota." He was to go to Washington to be seated in Congress as a territorial delegate from the Wisconsin Territory. If for some reason Congress didn't buy the territorial argument and refused to seat Sibley, he was to remain in Washington to lobby for the new territory.

On Dec. 4, 1848, Sibley's certificate of election as a delegate of the territory of Wisconsin was moved before the U.S. House of Representatives and referred to the Committee on Elections.

The recent killer storms which devastated St.Peter and Comfrey as well as those which swept through Alabama and Georgia have shown a disbelieving nation the destructive power of tornadoes.

Those of us that lived in Fridley on May 6th, 1965 need no reminder; that's the night the fury of 3 tornadoes descended on our peaceful little community.



That night 425 homes were completely destroyed and another 1099 homes damaged; many of these would later be condemned.

As residents emerged from their basements they would discover that the tornadoes had swept away their City Hall along with Hayes and Woodcrest elementary schools. That which wasn't taken by the storm was left in ruins. Amazingly, our Museum would survive!



Local landmarks like VFW Post 363, Fridley Lumber, & the National Food store were completely destroyed. FMC and Midland Cooperative together suffered over 7 million dollars in damage.

Some like Aero Space Corporation would elect to rebuild elsewhere; taking with them many jobs, families and neighbors. Fortunately, most of the residents of our fledgling community would choose to roll up their sleeves and join their neighbors to rebuild our hometown.

FHS is in the process of commemorating these brave and strong survivors of the '65 Tornado in a new traveling exhibit. If you have a story or a momento from that fearful night please contact us immediately.

MERYLE BERNTSON

Meryle is a true Fridley native whose grandparents, Karl & Kristine, emigrated from Norway to homestead a farm on current day Mississippi Street. Here they raised Meryle's mother Camilla who would later marry Herter Nelson and move to North-East Minneapolis. It wouldn't take long for the Nelson's to realize that city life was not for them and return to the family farm.

Here, in a house which still stands on Jackson Street, Meryle would grow up to attend the old District #23 school which once stood where the library stands today. When that school burned in 1929 Meryle would be forced to finish the 7th grade at Redeemer Lutheran Church where she pass her 8th grade exams allowing her to skip to the 9th grade at Columbia Heights Senior High on 41st Avenue: now the home Northwestern Electronics Institute. Here she would meet her future husband Ed Berntson while graduating valedictorian.

Her first job after graduation would be with North American Life for an impressive \$15 a week. Eventually, after 3 years of courting, she and Ed would marry in 1939 and make their own attempt at city life in North-East Minneapolis. But her roots were in the soil, and a year later she and Ed would return to life on the farm where they raised their two sons Bruce and Gary. Later Ed would open a gun shop which would later be used as Fridley's first polling station after incorporation. The original red, white, & blue polling boxed used at this polling station is on display at the Museum.

Sadly, Ed passed away in 1992. Please join FHS in recognizing Meryle Berntson; a true community treasure.

Herb Boxon

Although he was born in St. Paul, Herb is truly a Fridley native. He and his family moved to Fridley in 1936, but it wouldn't be long until the war in Europe would take Herb to distant exotic places... like Kokomo, Indiana where he was stationed as a flight instructor in the Navy Air Corp. Can you keep junior down on the farm once he's seen Kokomo? Yes! Herb left the corp at the end of the war as a first lieutenant and returned to Fridley with Kokomo's prized jewel; his new wife Betty (only 18 years old when they married).

Once back in Fridley, Herb and his brother Byron would help to rebuild our country by founding *Bacon Electric*. The company would later expand to include their father, Herb Sr.. Together they opened their business on Old Central in 1947.

Herb and Betty bought their house from Charlie Johanson and started a family. They had five children, Bill Dāvid, Sāndra, Pātricia, & Susie.

Not content with success in family and business, Herb began a life of community service by joining Wyman Smith & Mr. Erck to petition to have Fridley incorporated from a village into a city. This pursuit was delayed in court as FMC fought to be excluded from the incorporation. Finally, on June 7th, 1949 all their hard work would payoff as their dream came true and Fridley became a city.

Herb's father was elected to
Fridley's first City Council, while
Herb himself served on various
city commissions. Herb's family
were charter members of Fridley
Methodist Church. The church
held services in City Hall until their
building was completed. Herb is a
charter member of the Fridley
Chamber of Commerce &
Rotary Club.

Herb, along with Don Savelkaul, Don Harstad, & Bill Berry were the organizers and owners of Fridley State Bank until it was sold to Norwest in 1996. The group continues to own and operate Blaine State Bank.

Herb and Betty have been married 53 years and now have 12 grand children. They spend their winters Brandenton, Florida, but when in town, Herb uses his years of experience to help FHS grow stronger.

From the Collection

During the past year FHS has been very fortunate to receive a number of significant donations from both individual donors as well as the City of Fridley along with various additional city government sources. FHS would like to take this opportunity to make its members aware of some of these new artifacts either now on display or currently awaiting exhibition.

In 1997 the Fridley
Police Department donated
several items currently on display
in the Museum's City Government
Room. Included in their donation
were a gas mask (circa. 1960)
along with a *Drunk-o- Meter* used
by the department from 1956 until
the late 1960's.This device was
used to test drunk driving
suspects; very few of these
devices have survived.

In addition, the Museum received and currently displays an example of every police patch worn by a Fridley officer to date. Of special interest is their donation of a letter received by Everette McCarthy from J. Edgar Hoover now on display in City Government Room.



The Fridley Fire

Department has also been very generous by donating several uniforms, a glass fire extinguisher, as well as a self contained breathing apparatus and numerous photos. All these items are awaiting display due to a shortage of male mannequins. FHS is making a plea for members to keep their eyes out for male mannequins so that we can properly display these important items.

Last fall FHS received a donation from the City of Fridley of more than 1000 photos and slides

documenting various employees and events, most dating from the 1970's. The donation included several reels of slides from Fridley's sister city, Fourmies, France. The collection has been sorted and is stored in the Reference Room awaiting display.

Fridey High School has donated several old year books; several of the older books include photos of Fridley merchants. A similar donation was received from Spring Lake Park High School. Many citizens are unaware of the large number of Fridley students who attend schools outside the city.

Most recently, FHS has received a donation of hundreds of photos from United Defense, formally known as FMC and Northern Pump, covering the building of their Fridley operations along with photos of various facilities throughout the country. The photos require sorting and cataloging.

The Fridley Police
Department Civil Defense Unit
has donated several items.
Included in their donation is a civil
defense helmet, blasting cap
picture, and a radiation detector.
All items are currently on display
at the Museum. They also donated
a civil defense police badge as well
as a rescue badge. One item of
particular significance is a civil
defense police patch believed by
the states leading police patch
collector to be a one of a kind.

FHS would like to thank all who have contributed items of local

importance and to remind the community that FHS, as the repository of local history, is always open to donations of items which document the history of our community.

decision to remove the attic from this event. John Fitzpatrick and Steve Asche have previously expressed to the Board their disinterest in mounting this event under these conditions, however, they have graciously offered to consul FHS should we elect to run the event under new direction.

At this time FHS has no plans to replace this event. We would like to take this opportunity to thank John and Steve for all their hard work and creativity in making the Manney Sanool Monse a tremendous success. During the past three years this event has raised nearly \$3,000 while introducing more than 1,200 people to the Fridley Historical Society.

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

As always, the buses leave promptly at 9 am from the Fridley Commons parking lot on 61st Street just East of 7th Street and return around 4 pm. Tickets are \$5 and are available from Gloria Hayes at 571-3727.

The following is a summary of that document.

On September 23rd, 1949 the Fridley City Council adopted ordinance #26 authorizing the establishment of a municipal liquor store. A month later Fridley opened its first off-sale liquor store at 7361 Central Avenue. The following February the City opened a bar at the same location.

In November of 1953 the City opened a second off-sale store in a building owned by the City at 3710 East River Road. In 1960 a bar was added.

In 1956 the bar on Central Avenue was closed when construction on the new Highway #65 resulted in a loss of business. The off-sale operation would close in 1964.

In March 1957 the City opened The Shorewood Lounge & Off-Sale. The Shorewood was built with city issued bonds that were retired in 1971. The very same year the City elected to get out of the on-sale business resulting in the closing of both the Shorewood Lounge and the bar on East River Road.

Recently, while cleaning out some files I stumble across an old agenda of my late husband Ed's from when he served on the Fridley City Council as Third Ward Councilperson. The agenda was from 1977 and included a history of Fridley liquor stores.

off-sale store until 1974 when the closing of the Camden Bridge resulted in a loss of business.



The City continued to operate the Shorewood off-sale site until the need for additional space resulted in the opening of a new store at 6289 Central Avenue in 1973.



A liquor store opened in 1960 in a former shopping mall at 6481 University Avenue which rapidly outgrew its facility forcing it to move to Holly Center.



This liquor store would later move across
Mississippi Street into an abandoned hardware store. With the recent redevelopment of this area, the liquor store would be forced to again return to Holly Center in order to make way for new townhomes.

Another liquor store operated in **Skywood Mall** from 1965 until it was closed due to slow business in 1973.

In 1961 and again in 1969 Fridley citizens voted overwhelmingly to remain in the liquor business.

Today, the City holds no long term debt to support its liquor operations.

Gloria was born & raised in north Minneapolis where in 1952 she and Chuck wed. Gloria was employed at Minnegasco for 15 years where she began as a key punch operator.

Gloria was promoted to meter reading where she supervised all meters in Minneapolis and its surrounding suburbs. Later Gloria would transfer to the Home Services Department where she was in charge of Minnegasco's cooking schools which served as fund-raisers for local non-profit organizations.

Here her duties would include booking schools, designing posters, distributing tickets, as well as assisting groups while they attended the demonstrations.

In 1956 she and Chuck moved to the recently incorporated City of Fridley where they began a family. Gloria and Chuck's daughter Melinda was born on Valentine's Day 1960.

As Melinda grew, Gloria would become increasingly more involved

in her new hometown. Gloria served as both a Brownie and a Girl Scout leader. Later when Melinda joined 4H, Gloria would serve as district chair for Share the Fund committee where she honed her skills as a wily fund-raiser for which FHS is a fortunate beneficiary today.

Gloria has served on the board of District #14 Community Ed for 18 years. It was here that she successfully fought to save the Old Hayes Annex from the wrecking ball. Keenly aware that saving this building was far from preserving it, Gloria helped to found The Fridley Historical Society where she has selflessly dedicated herself to preserving the entire heritage of our hometown.

As a charter member, Gloria served as our very first vice-president and six months later became our second president following the resignation of Leon Madsen.

Gloria's tireless fund-raising activities have literally kept our lights on. Her casino trips alone have raised over \$10,000!

Gloria & Chuck continue to live on West Moore Lake Dive where they share their lives with their four kitties that most of us know as Gloria's babies. In May of this year they suffered the terrible loss of their cat George who was both a long time companion as well as a cherished member of their family. 


