This article was taken from the 1991 special issue of the Fridley Focus called Fridley "49er" Days June 12th-16th. No author was given.

Dastardly murder mars Fridley's otherwise placid history.

It's January, 1916. Frederick T Price is accused of the murder of his third wife, Mary Fridley Price, who was the granddaughter of Betsy and Abram Fridley.

According to anewspaper article in The Minneapolis Journal dated January 11,1916, Charles D Etchison, a friend and business associate of Fridley, was the star witness at the trial. The motive was money. Etchison told how Price would gain financially by his wife's death. In his testimony, Etchison described Price's actions. Etchison, Price and Price's wife Mary, went for an auto ride on Saturday, Nov. 28, 1910, following a theater performance of the "The Prince of Pilsen" at the Metropolitan Theater in Minneapolis. Price said he had some lots advertised on Marshall Avenue and suggested the three of them take a drive tp look at them. They stopped at the Price's home first to pick up Mary's dog, a small spaniel.

Price drove the car across the Franklin Avenue Bridge then turned to the right and drove down East River Road. About halfway between the Milwaukee Bridge and Lake Street, according to Etchison, Price said the engine was missing and stopped.

"Price suggested Mrs Price get out and exercis the dog," Etchison testified. "She objected at first. Then she said she would, I was at the engine. As she cleared the car Price put his arm out in front of her and touched her arm. As he did that, he ...hurled her over the bank. She went backwards."

Price and etchison then went down the path to where she lay on the rocks. "We ran down," Etchison said. "There was a plank and (Price) jumped onto it and then we got down to the river bank. We went right to the edge of the river. Then we turned back and climbed up to a ledge, about midway from the roadway to the river. Mrs. Price was lying there, moaning and groaning. There was blood all around her head and some on her clothes. Price said go up and get some help. I started at once. Just as I started I saw Price pick up a stone. As I stepped away, I heard Price hit her in the head with a rock. "Etcison testified that prior to the day of Mary Price's death, her husband had discussed his plans for Mary's death several times with EtchisonIt was Price's plan to explain his wife's death by saying that the dog fell over the cliff and Mary tried to save it. Price thought no one would question the story because it was common knowledge that his wife was devoted to her dog.

Etchison said he was extremely upset. "I couldn't work, he testified. "I couldn't sleep, and I couldn't even eat. I was sick and nervous."

Price hired a photographer to take pictures of the scene. "(Price) said he was going to sue the city for his wife's death," Etchison said.

But, apparently the jury didn't buy the dog story. He was found guilty and served prison time. The newspaper article that reported Etchison's testimony was found by a Golden Valley man and sent it to the city of Fridley.



OLD TOWN RECORDS DISCOVERED

The Minnesota Historical Society By Mark Bonesteel

The Minnesota Historical Society has always been a depository for artifacts and information. Recently, I discovered a dust covered box with the Fridley town records books. Upon opening the box, I discovered several volumes of Fridley Town records written in long hand. The books covered town meetings minutes, finance and elections.

Volume I contained information from 1895 to 1899. At this time the town had a general fund which collected money from various sources such as liquor licenses. The town also had a road and bridges fund. This fund was used to upgrade the roads and bridges in place at that time. Fridley included Spring Lake Park at that time. Town officials were elected and were paid \$2.00 a day when they were working. M.C. Ailes was the first town recorded town clerk.

Volume II contain the town records from 1914 to 1922. Town officials received a wage increase to \$2.25 a day. Elected officials included town supervisor, town clerk treasurer, assessor, justice of the peace and town constable. As the population of the town increased so did its tax base. The town's general fund in 1917 was at \$350 and the road and bridge fund grew to \$2000 It is apparent the town board recognized the importance of the automobile because this fund continued to grow.

Volume III contains the records from 1928 to 1938 The depression era brought changes in the town's finances. In 1930 the gopher bounty was eliminated and the town also recorded its second year of deficit spending. Going in the hole over \$700 in 1930. Town officials wages were now \$3.00 aday. The town continued to operate in the red until 1944 when its budget finally leveled off. The town value was \$600,762.

The final two volumes contain the town records from 1938 to 1954. A ton election was held in 1949 asking if the town board should purchase a site for a permanent town hall. The results were 342 yes votes and 163 no votes. Until this vote the town board meetings were held at various locations such as farms and even places outside the town. The last town clerk elected was Mabel Robinson in 1954.

Anyone wishing to review these records can do so free of charge. The records are located in the Minnesota Historical Society Reference Room. You will need to fill out a call slip and turn it in. It takes about thirty minutes for MHS staff to get the box for you but the wait is well worth waiting for Request the following: 102.J.8F. This number written on the call slip will get you the correct box and plenty of good reading.

Bill.

Thanks much for the calender. Kind of shook me up tho. They showed my folks old store and mentioned some centers but none named Plum- Ha.

My grandfather had the first post office in the store maybe before 1917. My mom would ride her horse to Mississippi Street and the railroad tracks. There was an arm on a post that would some how hook the mail bag to as the train went by.

Carl Hartman was my godfather. He built his store after my folks. Carl and my dad hauled coal etc.

I was the first village police marshall. Carl ran for mayor after I sat with him in front of his store till 1:30 in the morning after a Booster Club meeting coaxing him to run for mayor. After he got in he had me ride with him up and down East River Road trying to get me to enforce a 30 mile speed limit, which I refused to do. Finally he quit and then they hired police.

I gave one ticket to a guy named Bob ——he passed a school bus on Haye's corner and almost hit a kid. Carl called me and said gee Bill, Bob is my brother-in-law.

Wish I had a \$ for every time we pulled the trolley connection.

100 Twins Drive-In brings back memories. Wargo and Wyman were buddies. There was a pig farm where they wanted to build the theater. They paid my iron worker wages to sit in front of the pig farm to get the name of the fellow who hauled the slop to the farm each day. Ed Berntson would move quickly and fine them.

Hitched hiked from Edison one day and here were a bunch of men erecting steel at Northern Pump. I knew all of us who worked for my dad at the NSP Riverside site at one time or another. Funny you should mention Norman and the broken arm. I was on University Avenue over by Rice Creek and got into a fight with some kids from Columbia Heights. I got tripped over backwards and hit my elbow on the blacktop and broke it below and over the joint. Norman, Bernard Furney and I had our ponies and I was afraid to go home and tell the folks I was in a fight again. We went to Norman's and his mom sent me home.

I have lots of memories of Herder Nelson. Don Olson worked for him after high school. Same as I did and I went there and had it out with Don and did a nice job too. I remember Herder running around yelling "stop!" "Stop!" All for now.

Mary Sue Meyers,

In response to information you sent my daughter Georgia Theines Steland. Was really surprised at the drawing of the cemetery in Fridley on East River Road. Also, the only mention was of my grandparents & not other members of the McCrady family of which I am sure there were 6 others. The last member I believe was in 1950. Would say 3 were in the 1800's, the rest in 1900's. Can't give you the exact dates other than my grandmother in 1936 and my grandfather in 1928 or 1932.

I'm in question as to the map of the cemetery. From recently visiting it my memory didn't match with the map. Besides, the date of Wm J McCrady's, my grandfather, death is wrong as that stated on the map. Had noticed several places just marked with crosses when there.

Another thing I'm in question about is the records of the past (in the Anoka County Court House) being either not right or not even there. At 0ne time I looked up my birth record in Anoka and found it was recored wrong. Did have it corrected. Another time a cousin of mine had gone to the Anoka County Court House for some records. Found a lot incorrect or not even there. At one time I was in contact with a woman from the Unitarian Society by mail. Did ask if the Society had the records of Trinty Episcopal Church on East River Road. The answer was no. Had called the office of the Diocese of Minnesota. They didn't have them either. Even called a mortician in Fridley. The only information he gave me was that the cemetery was closed for further burials.

As for the records, would say they may be long gone. In early years in a small community like 36. Fridley used to be, good church membership records were kept. The name that comes to me is Hayes. If I am right I am sure they are all gone. However, the name Carl Hartman is familiar to me. He is mentioned in the booklet put out by the Banfill/Locke Center put out for the 50th Anniversary. The Carl Hartman I would know would be gone, but this one maybe a son. The Hartman family I knew lived on east River Road a bit beyond Rice Creek on a hill on the west side of the road. I don't know if my daughter told you I was born in Fridley in 1917. Baptized at Trinity Episcopal Church. Was born in grandparents home. My grandfather was the blacksmith of the area. Home and Blacksmith shop was located across the street from the Banfill/Locke Home, now the Banfill/Locke Center.

INCORPORATION 1949

Thanks to Don Savelkoul for sending FHS a copy of the Minnesota Supreme Court decision of March 30, 1951 in the case of Northern Pump vs the village of Fridley which upheld the incorporation of Fridley as a municipality. Since the document is several pages long and space does not allow us to print it in its entirety I have highlighted some of the most interesting facts. The entire document is at the museum for those interested in reading it. The decision was written by Chief Justice Loring.

On January 29, 1949 25 legal residents in the territory 'intiated incorporation proceedings by submitting a apetition to the Anoka County Board of Commissioners. The Board designated June 7, 1949 as election day. The result was 431 for incorporation and 343 against. On June 28, 1949 officers were elected and ordinances were enacted.

By inadvertence and mistake 48.5 acres already incorporated within the city of Columbia Heights was included in the territory sought to be incorporated as the village of Fridley. This error was discovered prior to the election and no Columbia Heights resident had signed the petition.

On July 15, 1949 Northern Pump and its subsidary, Northern Ordinance Inc., large plants located within the village area ,challanged the legality of the incorporation. A referee was appointed to take testimony and evidence and to make findings and conclusions. Testimony was taken and evidence was introduced. On November 3. 1950 the referee made and filed his findings of fact and conclusions of law that a writ of ouster should issue. The conclusion was based upon the theory that the mistake of 48.5 acres lying within the city of Columbia Heights vitiated the whole incorporation proceedings. The correctness of that conclusion was the first question presented for the decision. It was concluded that the Columbia Heights area was not included in the proposed village territory by an unreasonable attempt to incorporate unsuitable but otherwise eligible land. The Columbia Heights annex was included in the petition by mistake and inadvertence was induced by error in official county maps. Therefore, the court held that the inclusion of the 48.5 acres of the Columbia Heights territory does not vitiate the whole proceedings but that a writ of ouster must issue as the area

Illegally included. This brings to a consideration of whether the remaining portion of the territory in the village of Fridley is suitable for incorportion. The referee found that the territory sought for incorporation in the village of Fridley was, as a whole, "suburban in character with houses and places of business somewhat scattered". "And *** is so conditioned as to be properly 'subjugated to village governmen".

The proposed area is five miles long and from one to three miles wide. Contains more than 30 different tracts entirely disconnected to from other platted parts. 287 families have vegtable gardens and some 17 families are engaged in small scale farming. At the time of the petition there were 2300 residents. The village lies entirely within the suburban area of the city of Minneapolis. It receives "city mail delivery" rural mail delivery has been wholly discontinued. The population of the area has shown a marked increase during the last three to five years. There is a nucleus of residences in the Hyde Park area and other residences are scattered. There are 60 small businesses scattered throughout the village such as grocery stores, hardware store, taverns, sporting good store and a trap-shooting club.

Bailey Tiller, 1535 Gardenia, 11 year resident. Employed at Archer-Daniels-Midland Co. as blacksmith. Elected constable by village. Appointed village marshal.

Herbert Bacon, Sr., lives in Flannery's Addition. Resident 13½ years. 8 children. Elected and reelected to village council. Business man. Part owner of Bacon's Electric.

Charles Arthur Swanson, 3710 Kenwood St. N. E. (SW corner of village). Born in area. Son of former Senator Charles Swanson of state. Family was in brick and tile business for years.

Dreue Scherer, 840 Mississippi Street. 5 children. Resident since 1922. Building contractor. Village building inspector.

Ednar Erickson, 1465 Mississippi Street. 4 children. Lived in area 14 years. Carpenter and house builder. No public office.

Fridley's first mayor and city manager Edward Hartman and his wife Anna Ernest Madsen

Edward and Anna Hartman bought the Ficker farm in Fridley Township in 1907. The house they moved into was one year old and the house, barn and sheds were one block north of Rice Creek on East River Road. The Hartmans were truck gardeners and sold their produce in the city of Minneapolis. They raised tomato and other slow growing vegtable plants in hot beds. The Hartmans had four children. Carl. the eldest, was fourteen when they moved here along with his twin sisters, Caroline and Mable. A few years later Clifford was born. Mr. Hartman farmed for twenty years. When he passed away in 1927, Carl farmed the home place as a gardener until the area around here begin to grow into a village and then a

city and the sixteen acres had to be platted and sold. There are thirty-four homes on the farm and it is called Hartman Circle. Carl married Hazel Nelson from Constance in 1928. Carl had a store built on the southeast corner of the land. The Fridley Post Office was located in the store. Carl and Hazel had one daughter, Alice. She married John Ganter . Mable Hartman married James Woods. They built a home on the east corner of the farm. They had one son, Warren. He married Karen Miller. They live in Fridley. Carl Hartman was the first mayor of the city of Fridley. He held the office for five years. He was instrumental in Fridley getting the incorporation of the village and then the city.

ERNEST MADSEN

Ernest Madsen became the first village manager of Fridley on January 7, 1955.Ernie was born in Sheffield, Ill. In 1916 the family moved to Askov, Mn. On Valentine's Day 1934 he married Elizabeth Buck. They had two children - Leon and Karen. The Madsens moved to Anoka County in 1944. The voters of Fridley adopted the Council-Manager form of government at the 1954 general election. Ernie was offered the position of the first Fridley city manager. Fridley took great strides under his leadership: water and sewer was extended and as a result new businesses moved in. Population increased from 4000 to 10,000 in the four years he served. And very important a zoning and platting plan was developed.

Due to health problems Ernie's doctor advised him to resign. Ernie decided to go into land development. Some resulting areas included Rice Creek Plaza, some residential, Holly Shopping Center, a medical clinic. appartments and light industry. In 1960 Ernie was elected to the Anoka County Board of Commissioners and took office January 1, 1961. A heart attack in January 1962 forced him to resign from public service. In July of 1963 Ernie's life was cut short at the age of 50. The impact of Ernie,s direction in Fridley's early years can still be noted today. Ernie and Betty's son Leon retired as Fridley assessor. Leon and his wife Marilyn(Bush) are graduates of Anoka High School. Leon has been active in the community.

The Wassail Bowl Ale Games grew up around the Wassail Bowl. For centuries Snapdragon has been played on every Christmas Eve in every English Shire. Remeber the party at Dingley Hall where fingers were burned aplenty? A handful of raisens are placed in a shallow dish and brandy is poured over and then ignited. The trick is to pick up the raisens through the flames. A hearty laugh goes around if the blue lapping fire dragon sears a player's finger. While the game proceeds the song of the snapdragon is sung by the guests. "Here he comes with a flaming bowl. Don't be mean to take his toll. Snap! Snap! Snap! Dragon...."
