Paula Griebel, kindergarten teacher at Hayes, and Janet Herrmann, kindergarten teacher at Stevenson, assisted our members by being docents. Kathy Peacock, kindergarten teacher from Stevenson, also helpled for a little while.

Forty-five dozen cookies were provided by many members.

It was a successful event with one-third of the invited kindergarten students in attendance. I wish to say a big "Thank you!" to everyone who participated in some way at this event: students, teachers, parents, and staff and society members.

It has been a busy winter at the Museum in regard to building maintenance and improvements.

In December we had Care Air Conditioning and Heating of New Brighton come and service both furnaces and humidifiers. I spent the better part of two days there as the serviceman was in and out. Then in January the rear door had to be replaced because of accidental damage that occurred during furnace work. We replaced the wood door with a much stronger steel security door. Locating, ordering and installation of the door involved another long day. After the door had been installed as ordered I replaced the double-deadbolt security lock with a single-deadbolt outside, lever handle inside for ease of opening from the inside. Half of another day. Since then I've been trying to locate the source of a small water leak in the furnace room.

MUSEUM IMPROVEMENTS

Over the last year we have made many changes to the FHS Museum building. All of the windows and exterior doors have been replaced. The old windows were in very bad shape and were not very energy efficient. The new windows and doors are a great improvement. We had the walls of the two main rooms on the upper level painted. The ceilings in those rooms were also painted and any cracks were patched. The front steps were in bad condition so we replaced them and had new railings installed.

We are still planning on doing more in the near future. The next improvement is to replace the window shades. We have already received bids on the shades and we will be making a decision on them soon. If finances permit it we would like to restore the wood floors in the front entry and the two main rooms in the upper level. They are currently covered by rubber matting and tile. The wood floors would not only look better but they would also be a return to how the building originally appeared.

None of this would have been possible without the grant we received from the state of Minnesota and the fund raising by the members of the FHS.

GRANT UPDATE-FHS Museum Improvements

The shades for all twelve large windows in the museum were replaced last month by Sherwood Shades of Minneapolis. The old shades were in bad shape. Some of them did not work and others were missing. The new shades enhance the appearance of the museum.

This spring we will be working on replacing the flagpole on the front lawn. The current one is in very bad shape and must be replaced.

We would also like to remove the tile flooring that covers the original wood floors in the two main rooms in the upper level of the museum and thn refinish the wood floors. HISTORY



From the Anoka County Union of Wednesday, August 3, 1892:

"GREAT DAMAGE"

Last week Tuesday night's storm raises havoc with growing grain.
C.J. Swanson of Fridley, sustains a heavy loss in his brick yard.

Last week Wednesday the Union published a short item concerning the storm of the night before, which raged eight long hours, depositing 7.82 inches of water, and spoke of the damage to grain fields in our locality, but the enormity of the damage was never dreamed of until late Thursday afternoon, when your reporter interviewed several prominent farmers in this and Hennepin counties. In Hennepin County, on the heavy land (and almost all the soil in the northern part of the county is heavy bottom land), not an acre of grain will be cut. The rain pounded the growing crops into the earth, not in one direction, because at first there was little wind, but broke it every way. It presented next morning a twisted, turned, broken, flat mat, with which nothing can be done... In Hennepin County the loss is between 5 and 10 thousand acres, an amount frighfully enormous.

The condition in Anoka County is better, but very bad for hay. Many acres of small grain was spoiled entailing a heavy loss. Several fine corn fields were broken by the wind which howled about 12:30. Crooked Lake, in ten hours, rose fourteen inches by measurement, but fell seven inches next morning. From this fact the condition of the meadows can be approximated. In conversation with Anoka County farmers last week, your reporter learned that several thousand acres of hay would have to remain uncut as the machines could not go onto the wet and flooded bogs. The importance of this statement lies in the fact that hay will command a big figure all winter. Probably the heaviest individual loser in the county was C.J. Swanson of Fridley. His brick yards received a good many gallons of water, and the damage to brick, clay, machinery sheds, etc. will be over \$3000, he told a reporter. As was stated last week the lightning was something wonderful and played in the heavens incessantly, while the rumble of thunder was continuous..."

MUSEUM IMPROVEMENTS

Thanks to the generosity of American Legion #303, we will be replacing the flagpole at the Fridley Historical Society Museum in May. The flagpole we have now is in terrible shape. It is covered in rust and needs to be replaced. Victory Corps will remove the old flagpole and replace it with a new flagpole.

Our next improvement will be the installation of new oak floors in the two main rooms on the upper level of the museum. These two rooms have black and yellow tiles covering the original wood floor. We checked into the removal of the tiles and refinishing the original wood flooring. Due to concerns over the problems with the removal of tiles containing asbestos we decided to install a new wood floor on top of the tile floor instead.

We are also planning on doing the floor in the entryway. All this is financially possible because of the money given to us by the Legislature.





HISTORY

From: "Fridley, Our Home Town" by Emma Christenson Carlson

..."John Banfill was the original settler and proprietor of the town, having made his "claim" here in 1847. His was the only cabin grown to a respectable size when first I visited the spot, but long since

'City lots were staked for sale
Above old Indian graves.'
So what is Fridley now, was called
Manomin in those early days, and what was
attributed as legend was evidently true, that
Fridley at one time had been an old Indian
burying-ground, and that later when the land
boom came the graves were disregarded and
the land platted into lots and put for sale.

Among the first to follow the early exploreres into this new region were the missionary ministers of the various denominations that came from the East and South. There was Rev. Dr. Williamson, Baptist, who came from North Carolina in 1824 to "Little Crow" Villaage to serve the Sioux Mission there.

A little later in the St. Paul area we learn of the activities of Rev. Gear and Rev. Close, Methodist, Deacon Cavendar and Rev. Bradley, Baptist, Rev. E. D. Neill, Presbyterian, and Rev. Breck, Episcopal. In 1834 we find the Pond Brothers, Rev. Gideon and Rev. Samuel, Presbyterian working among the Indians from their little mission between Lake Harriet and Lake Calhoun. In the 1850's the Episcopal missionary minister, Rev. J.S. Chamberlain, served St. Anthony and the Manomin

Mission. Since Holy Trinity Church in the town of St. Anthony was consecrated in 1850, we can assume that this was his field.

It is asserted that the Manomin Mission, or St. Mark's Manomin, as it was called, was in existence in 1848. The earliest records were lost in a fire in later years at Holy Trinity Church in South East Minneapolis. Available records show that the Mission went into decay, and that a new chapel was built on the old site, under Rev. Chamberlain in 1858. It was consecrated as Holy Trinity Chapel on July 25th, 1858, by Bishop Jackson Kemper, who was then the missionary bishop for the States of Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota. The following year, on October 13, 1859, Henry Benjamin Whipple became the first Episcopal Bishop of Minnesota and served in that capacity till September 1, 1901. The Chapel was under his jurisdiction during that time. Today it stands as the oldest land mark in Fridley which reflects the events of the past."

HISTORY

September denotes the starting of another school year. To give you a look at the past the following is taken from Emma Christenson Carlson's book

Fridley - Our Home Town:

"Then there was school life. In the fall how happy we were to hear school started; we were always so anxious to see our new teacher. Among the earlier teachers was Mrs. Dave Fridley, then Lena Sloan, who taught in the little church. Among the teachers to whom my sister and older brother went were Miss Mc Guire, Miss Gordon, and Miss Jessie Moore from Anoka. Our school-house in District 23 weathered many a storm. ((This is the current FHS Museum)) It was already 20 years old when I started school there. My first teacher was Cora Putnam who later married Will Dermott; her sister, Nora, succeeded her. They both came from Massachusetts and were granddaughters of old Israel Putnam of Revolutionary fame. Because of the discipline experiences of these two teachers with some of our incorrigible boys, the school-board decided to hire men teachers....

What fun we used to have at school playing games at recess, and after a hurried lunch at noon, at our noonhour. Our favorite games were tag,

pump, pump pull away and run sheep run. When we grew older we would play scrub-baseball; sometimes we chose sides and kept score. Sometimes, too, we would break a window, but we would always chip in to help pay for it. Those are happy memories...."

General background of the school districts are:

In 1873 Manomin Township was divided into two school districts and designated Common School District Number 32 and Common School District Number 23. Generally District 32 is now Number 13. The Fridley District 14 generally comprises what was the old Common School District 23. For years the closest school to the north was the Bremer and Gallagher School belonging to the Blaine Common School District 47 and located along what is now Highway 65 and Radisson Road in Spring Lake Park. In 1923 residents in the southern portion of District 47 formed the Common School District Number 6 and built a one-room, frame building along Osborne Road and across the street from the prsent Woodcrest School.


