The Grocers of FridleyHistory Conversation #7



We resume our History Conversations on Monday, January 8, at 7 pm discussing the history of grocery stores over the past 100 years. There will be representatives of some of these early grocers who will tell their stories. And, as always, we invite those of you who shopped at these stores to tell your stories as well.

We were a farm community for 50 years, and many residents purchased their groceries direct from farmers, or grew their own. We did have a trading post in the 1850s on the Mississippi River operated by John Banfill.

The first grocery stores at the beginning of the 20th Century were very small, such as Plum's, Hartman's, Grosslien's, Gertzen's, and others. These were located on East River Road. On Old Central was Sandy Hook. In the early 1950s, we had our first "supermarket," Theisen's Market. It began business at Christenson's shopping center at Mississippi and University Avenue. This was followed by Bob's Produce, Red Owl and later the very first Cub Food Store ever built.

In the 1960s we began to see the convenience stores appear. In the same decade very large supermarkets appeared such as the Holiday Store on University and 694 (now Cub Foods), Sam's Club and the new Super Target that just opened this fall. Most recently, a number of Asian food grocers have come to town offering exciting new taste experiences. Today there are at least 10 grocery stores/convenience marts in Fridley, not counting the many gas stations that now offer a limited selection of food and beverage staples.

Help us create a history of all of the grocery stores that did business in Fridley over the years by joining us on January 9 and sharing any knowledge you have of grocers you remember, what food selections they offered, and stories of shopping in them. Also, please invite any former owners of these stores to come to the meeting.

December 7, 2006 Summary of Minutes

Meeting convened by Pres. Robert Christenson at 6:00 p.m. Others in attendance were Board Members Judy Anderson, Pete Bonesteel. Jerry Manley, Mel Manley, Alicia Manley, Lillian Meyer and Mary Sue Meyers. Also attending Director-Elect Dorothy Gargaro. The November 2, 2006 Board minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Alicia Manley reported total income for the month was \$3,390.50 with expenses of \$1,955.61. She will have the final 2006 budget results by the end of December.

President's Report: Christenson reported that the Anoka County Genealogical Society will be meeting at the Fridley History Center on March 5 at 7 pm.

Action Items: A motion was approved to accept the resignation of Jill Johnson and thank her for her excellent service to the Board. A motion was approved to accept the 2007 Plan for the Society. A motion was approved to affirm an emergency expenditure of \$700 to purchase a new water heater.

Committee Reports

Fundraising: Christenson reported he would handle fundraising until a new chair for the committee has been recruited. His emphasis in

2007 is to raise funds for a parttime administrator, a website and the publishing of a new history book on Fridley.

Hall of Fame: Mel Manley reported that the Hall of Fame Dinner was a great success, and our net cost for the event this year was \$800.

Archives Committee: Pete Bonesteel reported on the progress achieved this year in preserving valuable artifacts, consolidating storage, adding shelving, rotating displays, organizing files, and binding newspapers.

City & Family History Committee: Lillian Meyers made her final report as Chair of the City & Family History Committee. The committee will meet on Dec. 27 at 10 am to discuss the plans for the history book on Fridley to be published in 2007.

Newsletter and Public Relations: Christenson reported that the latest issue of the newsletter was a joint effort by Grace Norton, Gwen Nawrocki, Andy Oman and himself.

Christenson commended Lillian Meyer, Chair of the City and Family History Committee and Alicia Manley, Treasurer, who are leaving the Board at the end of December, for their excellent work and strong leadership as committee chair and officer in advancing the mission of the Society.

Meeting adjourned at 7:15 pm.

First Impressions of Fridley **History Conversation #8**



Our 8th History Conversation on Monday, February 12, will collect the impressions people had of Fridley when they first moved here. Whether you have been a resident of Fridley or employed in Fridley, whether for one year or 90 years, we are anxious to hear your story of how Fridley

appeared to you as far back as you can first remember. The potluck dinner begins at 6 pm — bringing a dish is optional.

The mission of the Fridley Historical Society is to disseminate knowledge of Fridley's history. Our History Conversations are focused on the first part of that mission: the collection of knowledge. The purpose of this History Conversation is to collect personal snapshots of first impressions of Fridley over many decades. Bring photos if you can.

The more people who will share their early experiences in Fridley, the more complete will be our history of the past. These impressions will be invaluable not only for this generation but for many generations to come.

Some things to think about in sharing your memories are: 1) Why did you or your family move to Fridley? 2) What impressed you most about Fridley? 3) What do you recall about your neighborhood? 4) What were the businesses you shopped at? 5) What types of transportation were prevalent? 6) What city services were available? 7) What community events do you remember? 8) What major events happened in Fridley the first years you were here?

We especially want to know about housing. We recently received a request from the City of Fridley to share what we know about Fridley's housing development to help them update their Comprehensive Plan. The City has invited our members to a meeting on Thursday, February 8, at 1:00 pm at the Fridley Community Center to share memories of the growth of Fridley neighborhoods.



Fridley History Conversation #7: "Fridley Grocers"

There was an excellent turnout for this History Conversation on January 8 with over 30 people in attendance. Members in the audience recalled the names of many grocery stores in addition to those described below. These included CUB Foods, which began in Fridley as Consumers United for Buying; Grosslien's — photo in 2007 Fridley Events Calendar; Stav's Superette; Ron's Superette; Jim's Dairy; Gertzen's; Tom Grieg's store on Fairmont; Park's Convenience Store; Vye's; Shorty's (Schuur); SuperValu; National Tea; Penney's Market; Piggly Wiggly; Sandy Hook, owned by Stroud; and Red Owl.



Art and Norma (Theisen) Swanson, owners of Fridley's first supermarket, "Theisen's Food Market." Norma related how Art Christenson approached her Dad, Johnny Theisen Sr. to open a full service food market in his shopping center in 1952. Art Swanson, her fiancé', was the first manager. Art told of the time people caught in his store during the 1965 tornado were given shelter in his walk-in cooler. The business grew over 18 years and they planned to build a bigger store across the street but could not get a zoning permit The City turned them down and instead gave the permit to Red Owl.

Bob Schroer, owner of Bob's Produce Ranch. Bob started his business after working for Buddy Shapiro of the Stillman Food Chain who had an open air market on East River Road and Mississippi Street in 1958. They were open May to September. Bob purchased the business in 1959 and added Christmas tree sales. His brother Jerry joined him in 1963 and they added a garden center and plants. They moved to Osborne and University in 1969 and have been expanding ever since.






Esther Campbell, with her husband Bill, owned Campbell Grocery Store (with gas pumps) next to the Locke House (now the Banfill Art Center) on East River Road. They purchased the store from Chuck and Ethyl With who had purchased the store from the Plum's who operated the premises as a grocery store in the 1940s. They had to close in 1953 because they could not sell the business. The store building was owned by Mr. Benz who wanted to tear the building down because it was very old.



Mary (Sullivan) Rozmark's family owned Sullivan's Grocery Store on the Southwest corner of 50th and Central from 1955 - 1961. Before that it was a grocery store and bar owned by Norm and Abbie Kinnan. There was a baseball diamond behind the store. The building is still in existence and houses a Mexican restaurant. Prior to that restaurant it was the Tycoon's Bar and Grille.

Warren Woods grandparents, Edward and Anna Hartman moved to Fridley in 1907 and purchased a farm house on what is now Hartman's Circle and East River Road. Hartman's grocery occupied a building on the north side of Rice Creek. It is not known who built it, but it started out selling ice cream and confections. Carl Hartman, Fridley's first Mayor and Edward and Anna's son, operated the store. The store was also a post office in the 1920s. The Hartmans sold the store in 1945 to the Harloffs, then it was sold to the Ames, then to the Sheldons, and then to the Skoglunds who may have been the last owners.





Bill DeCoursey lived in Fridley from 1934 to 1948. His dad, Fred DeCoursey, had a produce stand for many years on the Fridley side at 37th and Marshall. He farmed 10 acres along East River Road near the rail road tracks and 37th. He said that further up East River Road was the Evanoff farm that also had a produce stand and there were many other produce stands along East River Road heading to Anoka. He also remembers a grocery store on 42nd or 44th between East River Road and University, Pehlings(sp?) market.

Mark Bonesteel worked at Holiday Village in its early years. Holiday Village was conceived by Al and Art Erickson who also launched a chain of Holiday Gas Stations. Holiday Village started in Bloomington selling produce, discount goods and Holiday-branded merchandise. They opened in Fridley in 1966 at University and 694 and added more groceries. Their concept was far ahead of its time. Everything that Target and Walmart are doing now Holiday was doing in the 1960s. But it remained a private company and did not expand like its competitors. It was sold in 1998 and now is CUB Foods.


Fridley's Doctors History Conversation #9





How many of our members remember Dr "J." Dr. Jedrzejewski was our first family doctor in Fridley. But he was no ordinary family Doc. He became famous by undertaking a highly unusual intervention, never before performed in the U.S., to save a patient's life. You will hear the full story at our next History Conversation on Monday, March 12 at 7 pm.

The Fridley Clinic came later, which then became Fridley Medical Center. Its founding physicians were Drs. Lenz, Lester and Strait. I am sure many of you have interesting stories to tell about how these doctors affected the health of you and your loved ones.



Much of the health care Fridleyites received before the medical office building was built, and even after, was provided by a group of physicians in Columbia Heights who had formed Columbia Park Medical Center. Today they have clinics in five southern Anoka County communities, including the Fridley Plaza Clinic.

We also have had a number of chiropractors, which by Minnesota law can now be called physicians. Who was the first chiropractor you saw in Fridley and what was your experience?

Who was the first physician you visited in Fridley? Where was he/she located and when did you receive your first treatment? Do you have a primary care doctor or specialist you see in Fridley today? Are there interesting stories you would like to share about these experiences? Fridley History Conversation #8 "First Impressions of Fridley"

We had another great turnout for this History Conversation. We collected first impressions of Fridley from the 1910s, 1930s, 1940s, 1950s, 1960s, 1990s, and 21st Century.



Jim Lawrence. He moved with his family to Fridley in 1963 and lived in an apartment. Then shortly thereafter he built a home on Tempo Terrace in Melody Manor and has lived there ever since. He was most amazed with how friendly the people were, and impressed with the fire and police departments and the schoolteachers.

Grace (Clark) Norton. Her family moved to Fridley in 1941 where they found land prices very reasonable. She remembers the expanse of sky and the great sunsets, the crocuses that grew in the spring in the adjacent cow pasture. As a child she played with neighbors Roy Dean and Carol Scherer in the sand dunes by Moore Lake, and recalls the prairie fires caused by the nearby pig farm.





Gwen (Clark) Nawrocki. Gwen is Grace's twin sister, and remembers the swimming hole on Rice Creek by Channel Road which was close to where Earl Bakken built Medtronic because he swam there as a child. Their family lived on Able Street in a converted chicken coop they had moved to the property after the contractor who was to build their home stole all of their money. Neighbors helped them a lot after they lost their funds. Her and Grace's dad was Fridley's first constable.

Lillian Meyer. Lillian and husband Jack moved to Fridley in 1964 from Richfield where they had just had a close call with a tornado. And the year after they came to Fridley they experienced the big tornadoes of 1965. All three of their children went to Fridley schools.





Hazel (Breit) Linton. In 1937, her mom's youngest brother asked her family to move into his house in Fridley on East River Road because he needed a cook. She recalls the Minneapolis Anoka Cuyuna railroad that went through their front yard so they could ride the streetcar to Anoka or Minneapolis. She remembers swimming in the Mississippi River by the Minneapolis Water Works. Hazel was in the first class (7th grade) that attended school in Columbia Heights.

Jeff Hed. His Dad started a business with a man from Fridley in 1968. Jeff began working at Minco in 1990 and moved to Onondago Street in 1994. Before purchasing the house, he checked with the Fridley police about crime in that area and was told nothing bad ever happens in Flannery Park. The next year there was triple murder two blocks away. He married his wife Jacqueline last year and they remain in Fridley.





Commissioner Jim Kordiak. Jim was born in Fridley in 1951. His family lived here for a year and a half, then moved to Columbia Heights, and Jim later returned to Fridley in 1975, 5 years later moved back to Columbia Heights and now lives in Fridley again. He has memories of camping in Fridley, fishing in Moore Lake, and watching the 1965 tornadoes from Columbia Heights.

Bernadine (Scherer) Matushak. Her parents came to Fridley in 1931 and lived on Old Central Ave., and later moved to Mississippi Street. Bernadine got a job in Minneapolis and had to take the bus from Sandy Hook. It was a scary walk home at night because of all the trees and no houses on Mississippi Street. They raised turkeys and she had a lamb for 4-H for many years. After marriage in 1948 she moved to New Brighton and back to Fridley in 1979 and has stayed here because she loves Fridley so much.





Barbara Hughes. She moved to Fridley on Rice Creek Terrace in 1959 and has lived there ever since. She remembers many sandburs and few trees. The whole neighborhood worked for Honeywell because it was so easy to commute from there. Everybody was the same age, had 3 kids and the mothers stayed home. Then they discovered car-pooling so there was a car for the mothers to use. It was great living in Fridley during that period because you could help shape the community. She served on the Library Board.

Beth Werking. Beth is the Librarian at Mississippi Branch Library. She commutes daily from Rockford. She said we have had 40 years of library service in Fridley. The Library is built on the Rudy Riedel farm and a tree next to the library still has a steel hook embedded from the farm clothesline.





Don Meyers. Don was a teacher in Fridley (1958), principal of Fridley Junior High and State Champions Fridley Wrestling Coach. He married Mary Sue and they moved to 63 1/2 Way next to the Johnson truck farm where they lived for 42 years. He mostly remembers the tumbleweeds. His Dad worked at Northern Pump, even before it came to Fridley. His Dad was a member of the St. Anthony shotgun trap team who competed at St. Anthony Gun Club which was at about 60th and University Ave.

Pete Bonesteel. Pete and wife Mary moved to Fridley in 1964. Mary worked at a beauty shop on 42nd and Central. When Pete discovered that he had only 6 months remaining on his GI Bill, he decided to find a home close to where Mary worked, so they moved to Fridley.





Warren Woods. His dad came to Fridley in 1929 and built his home on East River Road. Warren was born in 1937, His wife, Karen (Milbert) came to Fridley in 1957. Growing up, he remembers Fridley being like three communities: East River Road, University Avenue, and Central. He has many memories of District 23 School, fishing for bullheads in Rice Creek, and Redeemer Lutheran Church.

Lowell Norton. His Dad bought 10 acres in Fridley in 1916 and built ten buildings that they called "chicken coops." Lowell was born in 1917 and has lived here ever since. They lived in School District 6 in Fridley. Mostly he remembers there were very few people in Fridley. He remembers the first paved streets in Fridley being done by horses and a paving crew of farmers. He also recalls eating sand berries as big as your thumb and surviving the big tornado of 1929.



Robert Christenson. Christenson was born in Fridley in 1936 when the population was around 500. His father was born in Fridley in 1902. He recalls the sand streets, the sandburs, sand dunes and Sandy Hook. Back then there was a sparsity of houses, mostly pastures, cornfields, and woods. He has many memories of the annual community picnics on University near Mississippi Street and fun times at the swimming hole at Rice Creek behind this school.

Fridley History Conversation #9: Fridley's Doctors

What a pleasure to have Dr. Jay Jedrzejewski's daughter, Barbara Jay, at our History Conversation as well as Bob Comer who was a Fridley Police Photographer, Jeannine Schlottman from the Fridley Medical Center (now Multicare Associates) and Dr. Gary Good. Once again we had a large turnout. The City of Fridley will be televising these History Conversations in the near future on the City's cable channel 17.



Barbara Jay: Barbara Jay spoke of her father, Dr. Jay Jedrzejewski, Fridley's first doctor who moved here in 1958. Fridley had one dentist, Dr. Trezona, and was looking for a doctor. Dr. Jay came from Poland. He had been in the Nazi resistance movement, for which he was arrested and sent to Auschwitz. He was also a concert pianist. Dr. Jay attended the University of Minnesota Medical School for four years prior to moving to Fridley. His practice in Fridley was his first role as a physician in the U.S. Barbara said that her relatives in Poland told her Dr. Jay absolutely loved Fridley and so enjoyed helping people here, after seeing so much death in Auschwitz. Sadly, he was killed in a plane crash on a visit to Poland in 1962.

Bob Comer: Bob was the official photographer for the Fridley Police Department and photographed Dr. Jay as he undertook an amazing operation on a man who had been electrocuted while digging a well two blocks from Dr. Jay's office. Police called Dr. Jay to the scene and he pronounced the man dead. But with nothing to lose, he asked Sgt. Fritz for his jack knife and proceeded to open the man's chest and with his hand, massaged his heart for 120 minutes and all the way to the hospital. The man lived another six days before expiring. Bob brought the photos to the meeting and left a set for the Historical Society archives.





Dr. Gary Good: Dr. Good spoke about his father, Dr. H. D. Good, who started his medical office in the 1920s near Lowry and Central and then moved to the second floor above the Heights Theatre. He built his home at 3825 Central Ave. N.E. in 1932 and moved his practice to his one car garage. The other two doctors in Columbia Heights were Dr. Blumenthal and Dr. Herbert. Eventually the home and office were expanded until it was finished in 1950. He averaged over 100 patients a day, 7 days a week in his busiest month during World War II. Many doctors became his partners over the years, and Columbia Park Medical Clinic started there. It remained a medical office until 1999 when it was sold to Bobby Williams and is a vacant building today looking for a new use.



Jeannine Schlottman: Jeannine is Executive Vice President of Multicare Associates that operates Fridley Medical Center and sister clinics in Blaine and Roseville. She joined Fridley Medical Center in 1971 as the clinic administrator. In 1962 Doctors Bernie Lenz and Herbert "Skip" Strait took over the practice of Dr. Jay. Dr. Ted Lester joined the practice in 1963, and in 1966 Dr. Jerry O'Brien and Dr. Nick Koropchak joined. They were at 203 Mississippi St. and did not fit into the space. There was only one bathroom for the patients and the staff. The Medical Center moved to a place across the street from Unity Hospital and both the hospital and clinic opened in 1966. The clinic was destroyed by fire in 1973 and rebuilt. The clinic expanded in 1977 and again in 1983 to the size it is today.

Please remember to send in your ticket order and check early for the Lasagna Dinner, Raffle and Live Auction to be held on Saturday, April 28 from 5-7 pm at Broadway Bar & Pizza. We have seating for only about 130 people and we have had as many as 175 attend in past years. There are no ticket sales at the door, so if you want to attend, you must send in your ticket form early.

Some members wonder why we send the tickets before they have paid for them. We do that to save postage. Two dinner tickets and twenty raffle tickets are sent to each member using bulk mail. If we had to wait for payment and mail the tickets first class once they were paid for, it would cost us three times the postage. This would not be a fiscally responsible way to run a nonprofit Historical Society.

So what do you do with tickets you do not wish to purchase? 1) Throw them away. We record tickets by payment only, so only pay for the tickets you wish to use. 2) Give them as gifts. And/or 3) Sell them to other family members, neighbors, co-workers and friends. There is no need to return them.

Do order tickets early. Do come and visit with old friends and make new ones. Do buy raffle tickets—we make very little money on the sale of dinner tickets, and <u>this is a fundraiser</u>—so raffle tickets and bidding on auction items is what we count on to operate our museum. And do have a good time at the dinner!

The date is Monday, May 14, at 7 pm. This is a very interesting topic considering the crazy genealogy of Fridley schools. We will also present a slide show of the 1965 flood and tornadoes recently donated by Janet and Janice Robidoux.



Our first schoolhouse was on the southwest corner of 5th Street and Mississippi Street, across from the Mississippi Branch Library. It had 8 grades. A 6th grade education satisfied all requirements for compulsory school attendance back in 1885. In the early 20th century, an 8th grade education was required. The final exam to graduate from 8th grade would challenge many 12th graders today.

When our first school burned down in 1929, District 23 School was built to replace it at 611 Mississippi Street in 1931. Today it houses the Fridley History Center. It had 2 schoolrooms and 8 grades until 1942 when it reduced to 4 grades. The next school was Hayes Elementary built next to the District 23 School in 1950. Hayes used District 23 School for overflow Kindergarten and first grade classes for a number of years. Hayes was destroyed by a tornado in May 1965 and rebuilt the same year.

In the late 1940s, there was even an elementary school that occupied an office building at the Twin Cities Arsenal. In the early 1950s, Kindergarten classes were held at Geneva Duffy's home in Fridley. Then there was rash of elementary schools built in Independent School District 14 in the late 1950s and early 1960s to meet the education needs of a rapidly growing Fridley population: Hayes, Gardena, Parkview, Rice Creek, Riverwood, and R. L. Stevenson. Other elementary schools in Fridley are Woodcrest in District 16 and North Park in District 13.

Please join this Fridley History Conversation if you ever attended any of the Fridley elementary schools, or were a teacher, principal, custodian, administrative staff, school board member, or had any other connection with our elementary schools. As always, we will video record the History Conversation and it will be available for viewing on Fridley's cable channel at a later date.

Board of Directors Meeting

Summary of Minutes

April 12, 2007

Meeting convened by Pres. Robert Christenson at 6:05 p.m. at Broadway Bar & Pizza. Others in attendance were Board Members Judy Anderson, Pete Bonesteel, Mel Manley, Pat Jaakkola, Mary Sue Meyers, and Dorothy Gargaro. The March 6, 2007 Board minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Anderson reported March revenue was \$939.25 and total expenses \$1,529.75.

President's Report: Christenson reported that the Historical Society had received a gift of a DVD with over 120 photos of the 1965 flood and tornadoes from Janet & Janice Robidoux. He also stated that Girl Scout Troop 2660 had visited the History Center on March 22 and held their meeting there. Curt Dahlin is going to do a presentation at the History Center Open House at 1 pm on Saturday April 14. Christenson reported that the Fridley Cable Channel 17 is now televising our History Conversations; he presented them with videotapes of the past 5 History Conversations. Finally, he stated he found an individual (Johannes Marliem) who could create a website for us for under \$300.

Discussion Item: There was discussion related to our accounts at Wells Fargo Bank. Wells Fargo is not paying the highest interest we can receive on our savings, and they no longer support our Lasagna Dinner and Raffle with prizes. The Board considered moving our accounts to U.S. Federal Credit Union in Fridley. We will first see if Wells Fargo will make a sizable contribution to our fundraising this year for the Hall of Fame Dinner, history book or part-time administrator.



We have many beautiful parks in Fridley: Manomin Park, Locke Park, Riverfront Park, Islands of Peace, Rice Creek Trail System, Fridley Commons, small neighborhood parks, and then there is the magnificent Springbrook Nature Center.

At our History Conversation #11, on Monday, June 11 at 6 pm, we will share our memories of the evolution of Springbrook Nature Center and the interesting experiences we have had there. This will be a pot-

But on May 6, 1965, the very date the community clubhouse and golf membership program were to be promoted to the local citizenry, three tornadoes hit Fridley. This convinced the founders of the project that maybe a message had been sent regarding their plans and that perhaps they should rethink this project.

Some years later, another tornado struck Springbrook Nature Center. You will hear the rest of these stories on June 11 told by those who were personally involved in the creation of the Nature Center and played key roles in developing the Center and meeting major challenges over the years. We want to hear your stories about Springbrook as well for inclusion in our video history file and televising on the Fridley Cable Channel.

Board of Directors Meeting May 3, 2007

Summary of Minutes

Meeting convened by Pres. Robert Christenson at 6:02 p.m. Other board members in attendance were Judy Anderson, Pete Bonesteel, Dorothy Gargaro, Pat Jaakkola, Jerry Manley, and Mary Sue

Meyers. The April 12, 2007 board

minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Anderson reported April income was \$6,214.50 and total expenses were \$1,736.83. The Lasagna Dinner raised \$4,721.50.

President's Report: Christenson reported that the City Council turned down our request for \$950 to do a photo project involving Fridley school children that would represent Fridley's participation in the Anoka County Sesquicentennial. The Council originally requested the Society create a Sesquicentennial event for Fridley but \$950 was more than they wanted to invest. Christenson met with Tom Newhouse from Town Planner Calendar who agreed to publish 2 to 3 photos from Fridley students in the Anoka County 2008 Town Planner Calendar should we choose to go forward with the project. A motion was made to go forward with "Fridley Snapshots -2007" by Gargaro, seconded by Meyers and passed by a voice vote.

He also reported he was requested to write an article for a special Ses-

quicentennial Edition of ABC Newspapers on "What it Means for Fridley to be Part of Anoka County."

Discussion Item: The Board held a debriefing on the recent Lasagna Dinner/Raffle/Live Auction. We received many highly favorable comments from those who attended. They especially liked the venue (Broadway Bar & Pizza), including the quality and variety of the food, convenient parking and access to the building, and the excellent raffle and auction prizes. The Board was strongly inclined to book the Broadway Bar & Pizza for 2008 but will consider other proposals.

Committee Reports

Archives: Dorothy Gargaro said she had an original school desk from this school that she would like to donate.

Maintenance: - Jerry Manley asked that the de-humidifier be emptied whenever someone comes into the museum. The air conditioning will be switched over. Mickman Company has activated the outdoor sprinklers. Fire extinguishers will be checked in August.

Meeting adjourned at 7:32 pm.





Fridley History Conversation #10

"Fridley Elementary Schools"

Our tenth History Conversation recalled experiences many have had at Fridley Elementary Schools. Who would believe that we have had 13 elementary schools in Fridley? Elementary schools still open include ISD 14 Hayes and R L Stevenson: private schools, Woodcrest Baptist Academy and Al-Amal: ISD 16 Woodcrest Elementary; and ISD 13 North Park. Schools that have closed are the two District 23 schools (one now our current Fridley History Center); the District 6 school on Osborne Road; and ISD 14 schools Parkview, Rice Creek, Riverwood and Gardena.



Lowell Norton "District 6 school, which served the north part of Fridley and Spring Lake Park, was completed in 1922. Lowell's dad had built a big house, and they had classes upstairs in his home for a few months until construction of the school was finished. "I was only five years old so could not attend school in my own home. But I went to the new school the next year and they had about 30 kids in one room with Kindergarten through 8th grade and one teacher. There was no electricity until 1931. For a couple years, I went to school an hour early to start the big stove that heated the schoolroom. They got a new teacher about every two years. When I graduated from 8th grace I was the second smartest kid in my class, of which there were but two students. In 9th grade, I went to Columbia Heights High School."

Warren Woods "I attended school in this building (the Fridley History Center which originally was District 23 School) from 1943 to 1947, first through fourth grades. Mrs. Koch taught first and second grade in the west room, and I had Mrs. Schmidt for third grade and Mrs. Dezurik for fourth grade in the east room. When Mrs. Koch wanted silence in the room, she had each student place their hands palm down on the desk making a Christmas tree with their thumbs and index fingers. For recess, they had swings outside, we chased tadpoles in the stream in front of the school along Mississippi Street, played pump pump pull away which was not encouraged, cowboys and Indians. Everybody wanted to be an Indian because they got to tie up the cowboy. My class went to Bremer in 5th grade, the Arsenal in 6th grade, and Minneapolis Marshall in 7th and 8th."





Agnes Shaw "My children went to Riverwood School on East River Road. When they had fundraiser carnivals at the school, I dressed up as a clown. We had lived in Africa, and my husband was part Indian. I did social studies for a number of years and would bring African things to class. We had the first PTA meeting at Riverwood School. We had a band called Kitchen Kuties that performed there as well.





Gwen Nawrocki "My name was Gwen Clark before I married. My sister Grace and I are twins and attended this District 23 School from 1943 to 1947. In first grade we insisted that Roy Dean Scherer sit between us in school or we would not go to class. There were times we stayed home and cried. Warren Woods thought Miss Koch was nice, but I remember Miss Koch walking down the aisle and slapping every one of us kids on the head so we hit our noses on the desk. If everything went well, she let us go outside and drink from the pump. Our parents told us to be careful of the toilets because even though they were indoor toilets, they were over a very deep hole. We were told, "Don't drop your clothes down the hole!" In second grade, Grace and I were sent to Columbia Heights to Oakwood because there was not enough room here. We were held back because in this country school we were taught to write in script and the required that you had to print at Oakwood. Then we returned to District 23 for third grade."

Grace (Clark) Norton "In 1947, Gwen and I went to Bremer School and I learned a very important lesson out on the school yard — don't believe everything you read in the paper. On the first day at Bremer when we got off the bus a reporter and photographer-were there. They wanted half of the students to get back on the bus and half to sit by the side of the bus with the teacher. The kids on the bus were to wave their hands out the window and the teacher was to hold a book and face the children. The next day in the newspaper it said that our room was not ready so they were holding class on the bus which was a total lie."



Robert Christenson: "I also attended District 23 School in this building from 1942 – 1946, the Columbia Heights schools Oakwood for 5th grade and Columbia for 6th grade. I went to the Twin Cities Arsenal for 7th grade and remember the food poisoning and the gruesome ride home on the bus. Eighth grade was attended at Minneapolis Marshall. When I went to this school, there were four grades, but the year before I started, there were eight grades, two rooms, and two teachers. In the second grade, one of the mothers, Mrs. Swan, started a hot lunch program at this District 23 School. Mrs. Gallagher was my teacher in third grade, and Mrs. Schmidt was my fourth grade teacher. She had family in Germany, and one day the kids were condemning the Germans and she broke down and cried at her desk.



Fridley Snapshots 2007

- 3) Fridley Buildings (homes, apartments, condominiums, senior housing, industrial, retail, government, houses of worship, park structures, museums, medical facilities, schools, etc.)
- 4) Fridley Family Life (daily home activities, birth & death, reunions, garage sales. child rearing, weddings, birthday parties, etc.)
- 5) Fridley at Service (worship events, community outreach, person-to-person care giving, non-profit organization projects, etc.)
- 6) Fridley Scenery (lakes, rivers, creeks, parks, landscaped yards, trails, seasons)
- 7) Fridley Learning (school life, life-long learning, vocational training, on-line)
- 8) Fridley Creating (art, music, drama, crafts, landscaping, design, products, floral)

The submitted photos will also be included in a photo competition with cash prizes. The judges will be photographers and artists associated with the Banfill-Locke Center for the Arts. Only one photo may be submitted in each category.

Tom & Anne Newhouse, publishers of the Town Planner Calendar, will select 2 or 3 photos to be included in the Fridley 2008 calendar that will be mailed to 10,000 Fridley households and 80,000 additional Anoka County homes. The calendar will also include a photograph of the student whose photo appears on any of the 12 monthly pages.

Winning photos will be on display at the Banfill-Locke Center for the Arts in conjunction with the Sesquicentennial photo exhibition July 14 – August 4, 2007. Photos will also be exhibited on the Fridley Historical Society Website (www.fridleyhistory.org) and at the Fridley History Center. Other venues considered but not yet confirmed include Fridley Schools, Fridley Community Center, Fridley Hall of Fame Dinner, and the Mississippi Branch Library.

"Murder He Spoke" **A History of Fridley Murders**






Mark Bonesteel, a police officer with the Spring Lake Park Police Department who grew up in Fridley, has been researching this in-



MeetingJune 7, 2007 Summary of Minutes

Archives: Dorothy Gargaro said the Committee has a large workload and will need help in scanning photos, editing and typing family histories.

Program & Events: Mary Sue Meyers called during the Board meeting to report that she had a request from the Fridley Women of Today to use our facility for their meeting and inquired about the fee. Christenson stated that the current rental fee is \$50 per hour with special prices for member organizations.

Maintenance: Jerry Manley reported the committee had a workday outside trimming, landscaping and weeding.

Board Comments: Dorothy Gargaro recommended we have speakers or special events for our museum open houses. Christenson responded this was the original intent of "Super Saturdays" and it might be worthwhile reactivating Super Saturdays once again. Gargaro will do some research on this.

Fridley History Conversation #11 "A Walk in the Park – Springbrook Nature Center"

We had a wonderful time at Springbrook Nature Center on June 11. It was beautiful evening, perfect for taking a nature walk in this beautiful and enchanting environment, musically serenaded by many species of birds.



Malcolm Mitchell, Chair, Springbrook Nature Center Foundation

The Springbrook Nature Center Foundation, founded in 1974, has spent many years protecting and enhancing this valuable property. Springbrook Nature Center is owned by the City of Fridley and the entire staff is on the City payroll. The land of Springbrook was purchased by the City of Fridley using city and state land and conservation dollars in 1971 and 1972.

Originally, there were plans to make the land a golf course, but in 1974 there was referendum and by a 2-1 vote, Fridley voted to make this a nature center. This was the kick-off event for the Foundation. In 1975, the Foundation offered the City the opportunity to lease the land to

the Foundation for \$1 a year for 5 years. The Foundation would operate Springbrook.

In 1981, the Foundation applied to the City for funds to build the Nature Center building that is now on the property, with the City receiving part of the funding from the Metropolitan Council. With the building in place, the Foundation decided not to renew the lease as their job was done, but the Foundation would continue to support the Nature Center.

From 1981 to 1999 many programs were added and visitors grew to the point that Springbrook was being "loved to death." There were concerns about overuse. The Foundation Board in 1999 decided to take the seven-acre entrance area and redesign it to accommodate major growth. Then in 2003, the City Manager presented a 2004 budget to the City Council that would eliminate all funding for the staff and operations of the Nature Center and just operate it as park.

The Foundation began a grassroots campaign and convinced the City Council to put this issue on the ballot. The Foundation offered to raise \$60,000 to help fund operations in 2004 plus another \$60,000 generated from operations. It took a super majority to pass the item on the ballot, and they were successful in gaining 52% of the vote—passing by a margin of 139 votes.

After the election, the Foundation took another look at the seven-acre project and named it the SPRING project (Sanctuary Protection and Renewal Into the Next Generation). In 2006, at the suggestion of State Rep. Satveer Chaudhary, they put forth a proposal to the State for a \$5 million project of which the State would provide half. But it did not pass. They tried again this year, and this time the bill passed but Governor Pawlenty vetoed it. They will try again in 2008.



Siah St. Claire, Director

Siah has been Director of Springbrook for 30 years, beginning in 1978. He provided a magnificent slide presentation of Springbrook's development and growth over the years. The total park area is 127 acres.

Springbrook is the largest natural area park immediately north of Minneapolis with a great diversity of native wildlife because it has native woodlands, native prairie grasses, and native wetlands. This unique park attracts many visitors even beyond Minnesota, having become a very popular destination. Students come from over 30 communities and visi-

tors from all 50 states and internationally as well. Last year they had 16,000 hours of volunteer work helping operate the Nature Center.

There are 8 different entrances making it very accessible. An aerial photo from 1938 shows no roads, but many haystacks. The land was never plowed, but used for dairy cattle. It was a great place for riding horses and duck hunting. By 1947, wetlands appeared, and there was less pastureland and more trees. There were no streets until 85th Avenue was built in the late 1970's.

The groundbreaking for the Nature Center building took place in April 1980. The architects designed a building that was partly underground and received an award for its design. The grand opening was in October 1981. The park was hit by a tornado in 1986. The tornado sat in the park for 16 minutes doing immense damage with hardly a tree left standing. Fortunately, the building was spared. Spring brook received the McKnight Foundation "Champion of Open Space" Award in 2005.

For the future, they will be focusing on how to maintain the delicate ecosystems of the park. Springbrook is unique compared to other natural areas because it has so many different ecosystems. Others usually have just one, but Springbrook has wetlands, oak forests, aspen forests, marsh wetland, open water wetlands, and a lot of different habitat all mixed in with one another.

They are also planning to accommodate a growing increase in visitors. The Metropolitan Council projects a 25% increase in households in this area over the next 20 years. So the plan is to take seven acres of the property near the main entrance where people can experience what they have come for without having them travel through the entire park. It will include a larger green parking lot. They want to expand the interpretive center building to accommodate large school groups, weddings, and business retreats. They are also considering indoor and outdoor amphitheaters.

The major goal is to use this environment to create community and nurture the human spirit...

Betty Ann Addison has been active with Springbrook from its inception. She spoke of the early concept of a nature center supported by a group of citizens including Barbara Hughes, the League of Women Voters and others. First it was going to be along Rice Creek, and Jan Seeger who lived on Ironton Street suggested a better idea, the place where Springbrook is today.





Jack Meyer spoke of others who were involved with him in getting Springbrook going in 1974. They included Leanne Sporie, Charles and Jan Seeger, Mayor Bill Nee, Wyman Smith and Don Savelkoul (attorneys), and Dr. Breckenridge (naturalist).

Lillian Meyer was a committee member with the League of Women Voters who went to every single house in the City of Fridley with brochures encouraging them to vote for the Nature Center in the City referendum.



Bob Barnette: Robert Christenson shared an e-mail from Council Member Bob Barnette, who could not attend because of a City Council meeting. Barnette wrote: "I was a part of the ten member committee in 1971 that looked at whether then called North Park should be a golf course or nature center. As you may recall, I was a major advocate for it being a municipal golf course. Much effort was spent on both sides of the issue. When it finally went to a referendum the citizens decided on a nature center. I still feel that had it been a golf course it would have benefited the City greatly. Braemar in Edina was built about the same time and they were able to pay off their 20 year revenue bonds in 8 1/2 years and it has been a money maker for Edina ever since. But I agree that a nature center is the second best use of the land."

Robert Christenson told about being on a committee in 1964 with Wyman Smith and others that planned to build a golf course before the land was even being considered for a nature center. The plan included a clubhouse community center for all of the citizens of Fridley, not just golfers, offering social memberships. Membership letters were to be mailed out on May 7, 1965, but the tornadoes struck on May 6 and we took that as a message.



Board Member Profile: Dorothy Gargaro



Dorothy Gargaro is new to the Fridley Historical Society, and is Chair of the Family and City History Committee.

Dorothy and her husband, John moved to Fridley (on Fridley Street) in 1970 after the birth of their second son, Jeff. Mike was just about two, and Ann was born on Christmas Eve in 1972. All three attended Rice Creek Elementary School, and that is where Dorothy started her volunteer work. She not only helped out in the classroom, but also was a Girl Scout Leader and Cub Scout Den Mother. At her church,

St. Williams, she taught Sunday School for years. As her children advanced to Fridley Junior High/Middle School, and eventually FHS she was on numerous committees, finishing off those school years by chairing (along with John) each one of their children's Senior All Night Parties.

She continued her volunteer work in education by being a tutor for the Minnesota Literacy Council helping adult students learn English and also helping a stroke victim regain her skills.

Dorothy worked part time for 15 1/2 years as an inventory manager for an optical shop. She was also a nanny for two years for some very special twin babies (Mikhail and Kiehlor Mack). Since her husband's death in 1994, she has been employed by the Fridley Schools, first working as a Special Ed. Para at the High School, and for the past seven years as a Health Assistant at Stevenson Elementary.

She has a patriotic spirit and has planned such events as the Fridley Street Bicentennial Event, Fridley's 50th Anniversary Freedom Fiesta and an annual event at Stevenson Elementary called Patriotic Pride Day, a 9/11 Remembrance, honoring our civil and military servicemen and women.

Dorothy recently received the Values First Award for an individual in the community most exemplifying the seven core values, and was also honored by Mayor Scott Lund proclaiming it Dorothy Gargaro Day for her volunteer activities and for being a role model for her family and the community.



Board of Directors Meeting

July 5, 2007 Summary of Minutes

Summary of Minutes

Meeting convened by Pres. Robert Christenson at 6:00 p.m. Other board members in attendance were Judy Anderson, Pete Bonesteel, Pat Jaakkola, Mel Manley and Mary Sue Meyers. The June 8, 2007 board minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Anderson reported June income was \$115.00 and expenses were \$564.52. She also reported that she and Warren Woods completed the 2006 financial audit noting no irregularities. Income for 2006 was \$15,183.33 and Expenses \$15,183.43 with a net gain of \$389.57. A motion to accept the Treasurer's Report passed by voice vote.

President's Report: Christenson reported on the Values First award ceremony at the Fridley Council Meeting and extending an invitation to Values First to seek opportunities for our organizations to work together in the future. He also reported on a book being written on the 1965 tornadoes and a request from the author for the Society's assistance in providing historical data.

Discussion Item: The Board made final plans for AugustFest which

occurs on a Wednesday this year, August 1.

Action Item: A motion was made and approved to delay implementing an Internet connection for the Society's website and securing a merchant account to be able to accept credit cards on line until we had significant products to sell.

Committee Reports

- Archives Committee Pete Bonesteel reported they are purchasing a computer desk and chair for the front office. The existing desk does not work well with the computer.
- Fundraising Committee Christenson reported he received a "Grants in Aid application" from the Minnesota Legislature. They are setting aside \$200,000 in funds to be made available to historical societies and one category is for publications. He will try to obtain \$7,500 to cover half of the cost to have our book on Fridley's history be published.
- Hall of Fame Committee Mel Manley reported that have received 5 nominations for the Hall of Fame. The deadline is July 31.
- Maintenance Committee Jerry Manley submitted a written report that all fire extinguishers have been recharged and the lighted sign has been cleaned.
- Announcements Christenson stated that the Anoka County Historical Society is holding their annual Heritage Home & Garden Tour on July 15 and the Fridley History Center is one of the stops on the tour. We will need to have Board members present as docents from 11 AM to 5 PM.





The History of Fridley Murders

Our speaker for History Conversation was Police Officer Mark Bonesteel of the Spring Lake Park Police Department. Mark was born in Fridley in 1966 and lived here 24 years. Before joining the Spring Lake Park police, he was a Community Service Officer in the Fridley Police Department, a police officer in Amboy and Vernon Center, and an Anoka County Sheriff Deputy.



Since 1989, Officer Bonesteel has been researching the 20 murders that have occurred in Fridley over the past 90 years. In 1996, he made a similar presentation to the membership of the Society. Since then, there have been 5 more murders in Fridley. Below is a summary of the first of 20 murders Officer Bonesteel narrated.

The first murder occurred April 24, 1917 when Minneapolis Police Officer George Connery was assisting other officers in Minneapolis with a traffic stop for speeding. The two individuals, Frank McCool and Joseph Redendaugh, could not post bail, so Officer Connery got in their vehicle to direct them to the Courthouse. Unbeknownst to Officer Connery, both of these people had been hired by Mr. Dunne to come to Minneapolis to kill Alice Dunne, his wife. He paid \$4,000 for the hit.

After Officer Connery got in the car with them, they drove off and at some point Officer Connery was shot in the leg. His wife called the police department later that night when he did not return home. The police undertook a massive manhunt to search for him. They even took children out of schools to help in the search. In the meantime, Alice Dunne was murdered in St. Paul.

They found a fingerprint on an item at the murder scene that led them to Joseph Redendaugh. He had fled Minnesota immediately after the murder. On August 25, the suspect vehicle in which Officer Connery was shot was found in St. Paul. It had been stolen in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. When they found the car, they noted that carpeting, the floor rug, had been taken out of the back seat.

Officer Connery's body was found on May 5 along Rice Creek (in the newspaper articles it stated, "Rice Creek in the area known as Fridley.") The carpeting from the car was found alongside his body. They found marks on his body showing he had been dragged through the woods to Rice Creek.

The crank from the car was missing, and when they found it on May 5, it had blood on it. It appeared to the investigators at that time that Officer Connery had been beaten with the crank over his head repeatedly. At some point, they had pulled his cap down over his head. They left him for dead.

But when they found his body on May 5 they also found a notebook in his pocket. In the notebook was a detailed description of the two suspects, and a farewell note to his wife and five kids. So, at some point he must have awakened to do this before he succumbed to his wounds.

Frank McCool was arrested in Fort Platte, Nebraska on May 8 and on him they found Officer Connery's pocketknife and gun. Their ballistics showed the same gun that had killed Alice Dunne also killed Officer Connery. He named Redendaugh as the other suspect who was arrested May 11 in San Francisco along with his wife for harboring a fugitive. To spare his wife, Redendaugh pled guilty and was sentenced to 45 years in prison. He was released from Stillwater on May 9, 1962. McCool pled not guilty, was sentenced to 30 years in prison



History Book of 1965 Tornadoes

Al Taylor, a teacher, is writing a history book of the three tornadoes that struck Fridley May 6, 1965. The Fridley Historical Society is assisting Mr. Taylor with his research on this project. where he died. Mr. Dunne was convicted of planning the murder of his wife and died in prison in 1958.

Question from audience: "Out of 20 murders, only 4 are unsolved. Is that normal?" Officer Bonesteel replied, "Now-a-days it is much harder to get away with murder because of the technology involved, but because of all the crime shows on TV everyone expects DNA tests, etc. But it is only used on big cases, and you have to be pretty good to get away with murder today.

He stated that there may have been a 21st murder in Fridley back in 1907, and he is still researching that one. There was a murder in the 1914 of Mary Fridley Price but that happened in Minneapolis.



Bob Comer: Mr. Comer was official police photographer for Fridley from the late 1950s into the 1960s.

He spoke of being called late one night in 1967 by Chief McCarthy to a murder scene. This woman, Delores, was living with her mother after being separated from her husband. Her husband was laying in wait at her mother's house with a 12-gauge shotgun. Delores returned home with a male friend in a Pontiac convertible. Her husband walked up to the door of the convertible and fired the shotgun through the door panel at the male friend. Delores ran out the other door to a neighbor across the street. She got to the

steps and he killed her there and then walked back, re-loaded, and fired more shots at the driver of the car.

Ray Baker of the Anoka County Sheriff's Department got a search warrant and they went to the suspect's house—he lived with his mother and had a gun rack with rifles and shotguns. When they arrived, they saw the suspect's tie lying over the gun rack with the shotgun on top of the tie. Chief McCarthy said, "If we can just find someone who saw him wearing that tie the night of the murder, we got him." And they did. They had a perfect case of first-degree murder but the prosecutor for some strange reason let him plead guilty to second-degree murder and he only served a short sentence.

Ron Allard: Officer Allard is a former Fridley Police Officer.



Regarding the murder case described by Mr. Comer above, Officer Allard stated that before becoming a police officer, he worked for the Great Northern Railroad as did the father, Pete, of the deceased woman, Delores. Pete lived across the street from where this all happened. Officer Allard said "I had the distinction of going across the street telling dad what happened to his daughter. I have known Pete for years and years and he is deceased now too." In response to an audience question, Allard says he occasionally works on cold cases he for-

merly worked on, like the Barbara Boyles case, but the chief suspect has died in that case, he believes in an auto accident in California. He was also the cop on duty the night of the murder at Red's Club, but does not remember seeing any evidence of four shots as reported in the newspaper.

Mikhail and Kiehlor Mack's First
Prize Winning Science Project

Our first presenters will be Mikhail and Kiehlor Mack, twin sons of Society members Stan Mack, II and Margaret Liebfried. Mikhail and Kiehlor are freshman at Fridley High School. Mikhail and Kiehlor created a science exhibit for a national History Day competition under the theme "Triumph & Tragedy." There were 700,000 (yes, seven hundred thousand!!) entrants and their exhibit received the first place Gold Medal. Their topic was the Reserve Mining pollution of Lake Superior and local fresh water supplies.

Pam Meyer, Former Fridley Teacher

We will also feature on this program Pam Meyer, a former Fridley schoolteacher. She taught 3rd Grade at Robert L. Stevenson Elementary School. On her retirement, she was provided a Book of Appreciation written by former students. She will share some of these stories of who they are now as adults and the benefits of their education under her tutelage.



Finally, we will open the microphone for you to share remembrances of organizations you belonged to in Fridley that served youth (4-H, Fridley Teen Center, Boy Scouts & Cub Scouts, Campfire Girls & Girl Scouts, American Field Service, car clubs, etc.).

Board of Directors Meeting

August 2, 2007 Summary of Minutes

Meeting convened by Pres. Robert Christenson at 6:00 p.m. Other board members in attendance were Judy Anderson, Jerry Manley, Mel Manley, and Dorothy Gargaro. Visitors included Al Taylor who is writing a book on the 1965 tornadoes and Vickie Rockwell, Women of Today. The July 5, 2007 board minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Anderson reported July income was \$229.50 and expenses were \$632.69.

Action Items: Motion made, seconded and approved to apply for a \$2,500 grant from the Minnesota Historical Society for video equipment to be used for History Conversations, interviews of Fridley leaders, and family video histories. The State of Minnesota allocated \$200,000 in grant money to help local historical societies. The Minnesota Historical Society will administer the grants.

Discussion Item: The Board reviewed our experience with this year's AugustFest. Over 100 attended, with great music, magic show, and ball game. Everyone had a wonderful time in spite of the ball game being stopped a little after 8 pm when lightning strikes were seen moving in our direction shortly followed by a heavy downpour and one air conditioner breaking down.

Action Item: A motion was made and approved to delay implementing an Internet connection for the Society's website and securing a merchant account to be able to accept credit cards on line until we had significant products to sell.

Committee Reports

Hall of Fame Committee: - Mel Manley reported that he had received about nine nominations for the 4th Annual Hall of Fame. Christenson suggested expanding the Hall of Fame to include community service hall of fame for Fridley nonprofits. A business hall of fame is in progress.

Maintenance: - Jerry Manley reported the upstairs air conditioner quit working the day of August-Fest. Dave's Heating and Air conditioning did a temporary fix on the compressor, and offered us a new compressor that would cost \$2,000 (retail is \$4,000). Installation is \$700.

Meeting adjourned at 7:05 pm.

We are also exploring topics for History Conversations next year. If you have a topic you would like to suggest, again, please call our voice mail and let us know the topic of interest to you.





12th Annual AugustFest 2007



The Board recommended changing the dates for membership meetings and History Conversations to the 3rd Monday of the month.

Meeting adjourned at 7:05 PM




Vicki Rockwell Joins Board of Directors

Fridley History Conversation #13 Fridley Youth



Mikhail and Kiehlor Mack

Over 50 people attended our History Conversation on Fridley Youth. Mikhail and Kiehlor Mack, sophomores at Fridley High School who are twin brothers, presented the History Day display that won each of them four gold medals at the History Day competition that focused this year on Triumph and Tragedy. They presented their exhibit on the pollution created by Reserve Mining, which was on display at our History Center, and a video of an early TV broadcast featuring Grant Merritt, the PCA commissioner at the time of the Reserve Mining controversy.

They won the competition at Fridley High School, the regional competition in South Central Minnesota competing against 250 students of which eight qualified to go to State. At State they competed against 100 students and won the first place gold medals. First and second prizewinners were eligible to go to national.

The national competition was at the University of Maryland in June of this year. It appeared on the History Channel website. Neither of them expected to win any prizes, although they had some hope. First announced was the Rachel Carson Centennial Award for the most excellent exhibit in environmental history sponsored by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Kiehlor and Mikhail, to their great amazement, won that award and received their medals and \$1,000, which they intend to use for scholarship funds.

Then the winners of the Senior Group Exhibit were announced. First announced was the third place winner, then the second place and finally the gold medal for the national first place award. When the announcer said, "Fridley!" they were blown away, for it meant that their exhibit earned each of them a first place gold medal for the best exhibit in the nation. Over 700,000 students competed in this national History Day event.

Their exhibit was purchased by the Minnesota History Center (for \$1) and will have a permanent place in their collection. The video of their presentation at the History Center is available for viewing at Fridley History Center open houses the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of the month.

The student spoke very little English when she arrived in the U.S. The letter thanked Pam for being her teacher and then told how she went to college, graduated a year early with a Bachelor of Arts in Biochemistry, is doing cancer research at the University of Minnesota, and will be working on a Ph.D. to be a college professor.

Every year Pam asked her students to create a "Someday" book that told about things her students intended to do or achieve in their life. She brought Katie Stevenson, one of her former third grade students at Stevenson Elementary School, to share her "Someday" book. Katie read her book, dedicated to Pam Meyer, "the best teacher in the world," accompanied on each page with a hand drawn picture. She won a blue ribbon at the Anoka County Fair for her "Someday" book.







Annual Meeting Minutes

Meeting was called to order by President Robert Christenson at 6:50 pm.

Christenson welcomed everyone to the Annual Meeting. He asked a show of hands of those who were active members for the purposes of voting. He introduced the Board of Directors.

Christenson reconvened the meeting at 8:05 pm. Mel Manley presented the Nominating Committee Report. He stated that there are three openings on the Board for 2008. He moved to nominate Vicki Rockwell for a 3-year term. Vicki was appointed by the Board in September to fill a current vacancy. The nomination was seconded by Agnes Shaw and approved. He then nominated Jerry Manley to serve an additional 3-year term, seconded by Mary Sue Meyers and approved. Mel next nominated Mary Sue Meyers to serve an additional 3-year term, seconded by Rosemary Biedron, and approved.

Mary Sue Meyers, Chair of the Program & Events Committee reported on all of the 13 programs and events that have been held in the past year, as well as upcoming events the remainder of the year (Hall of Fame Dinner, Kindergarten Art Fair, and Christmas Concert).

Dorothy Gargaro, Chair, City History Committee reported on the work undertaken over the past six years in producing a history of Fridley. The manuscript is 95% completed and only funding remains to publish the book.

Pete Bonesteel, Chair, Archives Committee, reported on the digitizing of photos undertaken by him and his son, Mark Bonesteel. This is a multi-year project.

Robert Christenson, Chair of Fundraising Committee and Newsletter and PR Committee reported on the efforts underway to raise funds from calendar ads and finding a corporate underwriter for the Fridley History Book and corporate sponsors for the Hall of Fame dinner.

Because of the talented Board you have elected over the years, I have no concerns about leaving my role as president. I will continue to write the newsletter, continue to do fundraising and continue my board service.






