Fridley Historical Society Board Meeting ~ September 5, 2024

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> The financial summary report was given for July & August. The motion was approved by Rob Zelenak and seconded by Mary Sue Meyers. Motion carried.

<u>Secretary's Report:</u> Motion to approve August minutes was made by Mary Ann Hoffman and seconded by Dorothy Gargaro.

Membership Report: Membership is now at 142. Three new members joined since the last meeting.

<u>Maintenance Report:</u> We will be reaching out to another handyperson to fix the railing. The person who we had contacted can no longer do the job. Partitions in the basement have been removed. The goal is to have the East wall painted, organize things stored, and create a space to film old-timers from Fridley.

<u>Lasagna Dinner and Hall of Fame Update:</u> Hall of Fame Awards will go to: Glenn Johanson, Betty Ann Addison, and the Fridley Lions Club. Mary Sue Meyers requested we try to get raffle prizes. The goal is to have 100 prizes.

<u>Next Newsletter:</u> The next newsletter will have a recap of the Lasagna Dinner, Raffle, Hall of Fame recipients and annual meeting recap. <u>Fridley Early Grant Update:</u> There will be a pause in the large grant process until after Christmas. The 2012 grant allowed FHS to interview long-time Fridley residents. Mary Ann Hoffman will be reaching out to the participants or their family members to attend a meeting on either 10/22 or 10/25 in the afternoon to gather artifacts from their family. The grant consultant (Steve Boyd) liked this idea.

<u>Archives and Exhibits Update:</u> A donation for the next time capsule was made. A school ledger from Mid 1920 – early 1930 was donated by Hayes School. Mary Ann Hoffman received another copy of the book, "Fridley – Our Home Town" written by Emma Christenson.

Social Media Update: Rob reported there are now 19 videos on the YouTube channel. The site has 73 subscribers.

Betty Ann Addison ~

Betty Ann Addison enjoys inspiring love of the natural world. Her vision has helped shape notable landscapes in Fridley and the surrounding metro, from the yards and gardens of residents to large public spaces. She owned two plant nurseries: Rice Creek Gardens in Blaine and the current Gardens of Rice Creek in Fridley. In 1973, she started a small nursery for unusual evergreens and rare plants. Gardeners from all over Minnesota and surrounding states come to visit Betty Ann's gardens and nursery, making her a Fridley community treasure. The Peace Garden at Lake Harriet was designed and built under her direction, as well as the Rock Garden at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum. Betty Ann's legacy also involves the Rice Creek Trail, where she organized community members to press Anoka County to develop the trail by petition and meetings, thus avoiding a proposed garbage transfer station on the banks of Rice Creek.

Fridley Lions Club ~

The Fridley Lions Club was chartered 70 years ago. Consistent with the Lions' Mission "We Serve", the Fridley Lions have been the primary service organization in Fridley for the community, schools, and needy people. The organization consists of about 60 members who contribute their time and energy to many worthwhile projects within Fridley and Anoka County. The Fridley Lions have been very fortunate in being able to donate funds to various causes within Fridley. Over the past 35 years, the Fridley Lions have donated \$6.1 million from Charitable Gambling Operations. The breakdown in donations are: schools – 44%, community – 18%, needy people and organizations – 38%. The Lions are also the major contributor to a non-profit, the Friends of the Fridley Education Foundation, which donates thousands of dollars to Fridley High graduates and Fridley youth.

Glenn Warren Johanson ~

Glenn Warren Johanson was a third generation Johanson who was born, raised and lived in Fridley as an adult. He was committed to helping in the development of the City, and served on numerous local committees, including the city council and the school district school board. In the early 1950s Glenn was a charter member of the Fridley fire department. He served as a trustee for the Fridley city council in 1954 and as a Fridley council member in 1955-1956 as the city was beginning to experience significant growth. During the mid 1950s Glenn served as acting Mayor for a period of time and was appointed the first Village Marshall, and also was a member of the recreation committee. From June 1957 through 1964, Glenn served as the council member-at-large. During his time on the council he was instrumental in helping establish the installation of the water and sewer systems that the city has today.


Grant Update by Mary Ann Hoffman, VP and Grants Chair

In the last several newsletters, a synopsis of one of the interviews collected by the Fridley Historical Society in 2012 has been recorded. This continues the series.

Lee Switzer

Lee grew up on a North Dakota farm and aspired to be a schoolteacher. After four years of teaching, he realized there would be greater opportunity for advancement in education if he moved to the Twin Cities. He connected with the Fridley school district, which was experiencing a growth spurt, and was hired as a 6th grade teacher at one-year-old Parkview Elementary. Lee was 26 years old and he and his wife were expecting their first baby.



He signed a contract for \$4,900. Due to an expanding student population, the Parkview schedule was divided into two shifts; Lee taught the morning shift. This allowed him to work for the Fridley assessor's office in the afternoons in order to supplement his income. Lee descibed a portion of his career by saying, "I was at Parkview. I taught there for four years and then when they opened the elementary school at the Senior High School, I was the Teaching Principal there, my fifth year in Fridley. And then in my sixth year they opened up an elementary school in the Junior High School, so I was given the principalship of both the Senior High Elementary and the Junior High Elementary." The following year he was named Principal of Parkview Elementary. Eventually, he earned a doctorate in education.

Lee's fondness for the Parkview families was evidenced when he stated, "I've always thought that the Parkview community was a close-knit community, that the people in that area were starting out in life with their families and they liked their school and the location of their school and everybody walked to their school -and I think they felt they had a good staff at the school, and they were extremely supportive of the school." Later in the interview he added that Fridley was sometimes referred to as "Fertile Flats. There were families with four, five, six children." In addition, he pointed out that, "When I first came, the family unit was very strong. Very strong."

In 1963, the Switzers bought a new home on a corner lot on 7th Street, for which they paid \$17,700. According to Lee, the houses in his neighborhood were, "Starter houses....7th Street was brand new...and by our house, going south, the road was all sand. The asphalt ended at 59th Street. South of that was sand until they put in the freeway."

Lee Switzer continued...

In regard to Fridley in those years, Lee remarked, "The things parents would do then, what parents would not even dream of doing now with respect to the safety of their children....We had a school carnival every year and the children would sell tickets for a raffle. They'd go door-to-door. These were fifth and sixth graders, and third and fourth graders, and no one thought any problem about children going door-to-door by themselves."

By 1978, the demographics in Fridley had changed, causing the school district to face declining enrollment in its elementary schools. As a result, the Fridley school board closed three schools in one fell swoop: Parkview, Gardena, and Riverwood. Lee then became Principal of Hayes Elementary, where he remained until his retirement in 1992, completing over 30 years of serving Fridley Schools.
